

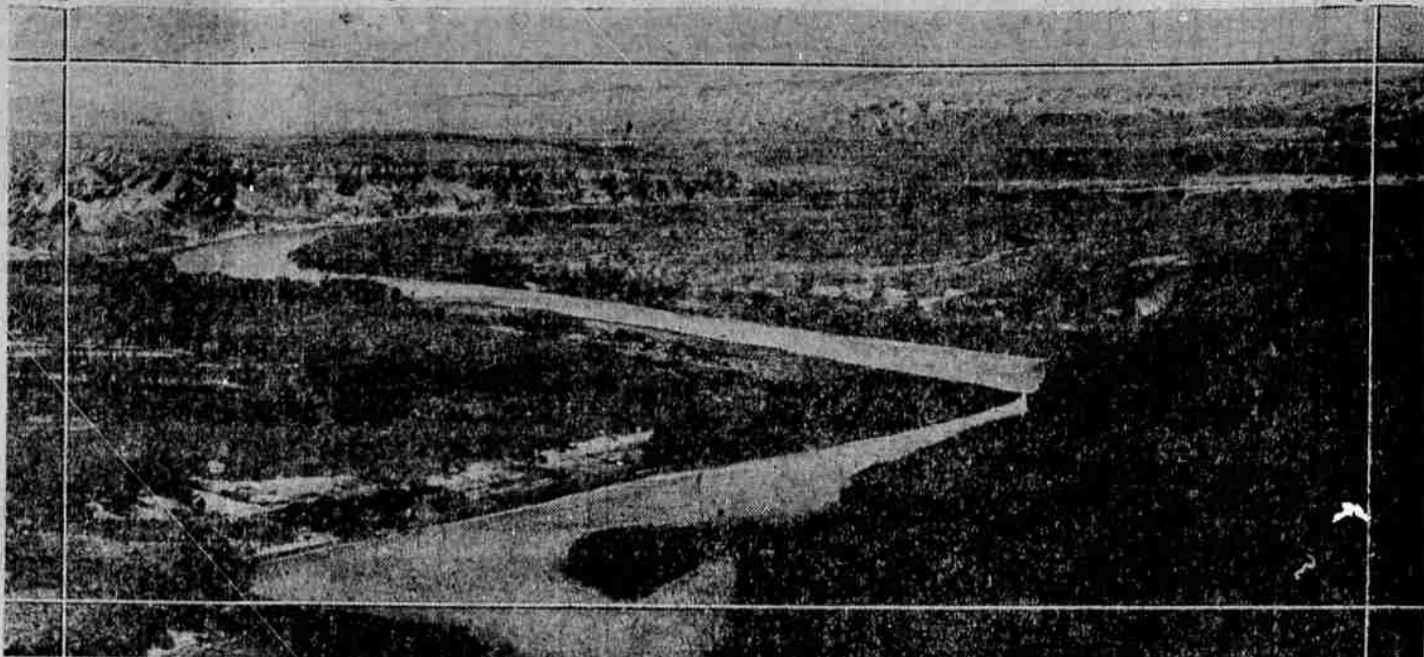
NEWS of the DAY in PICTURES

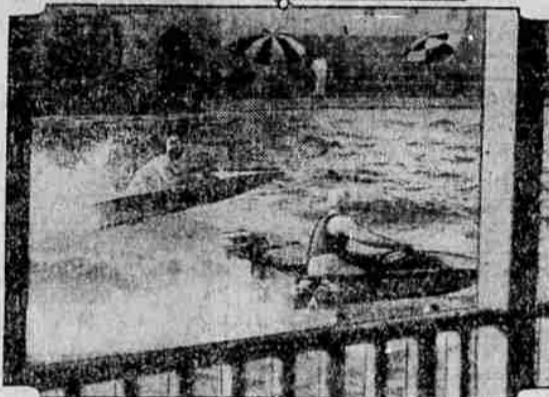

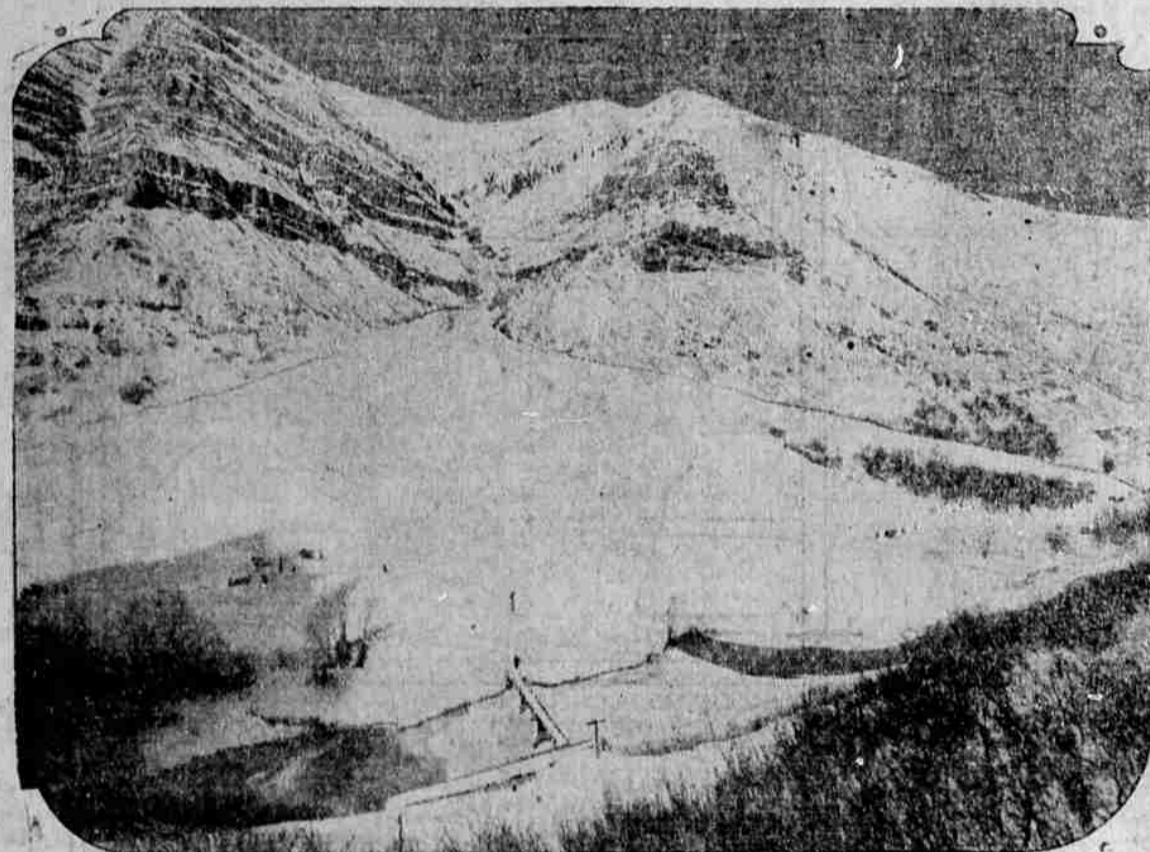

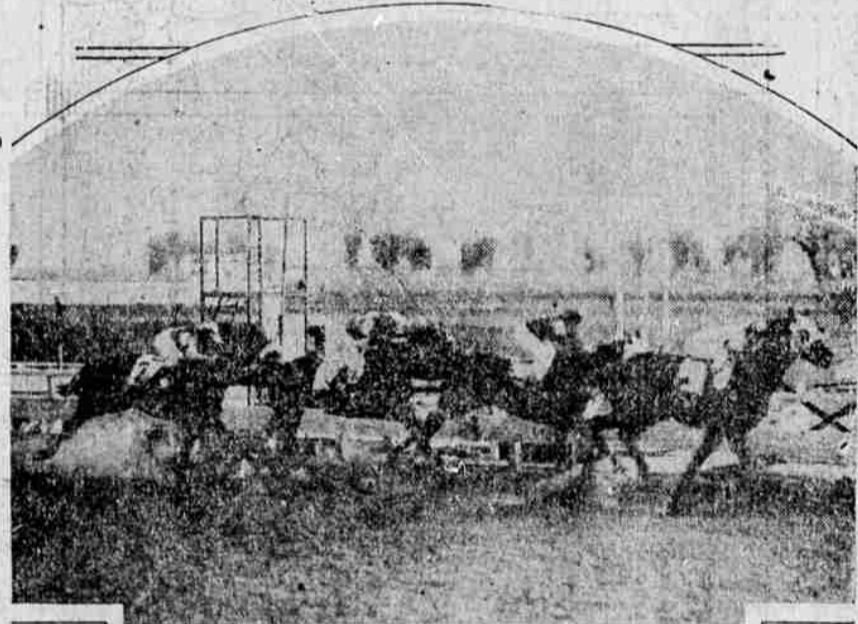

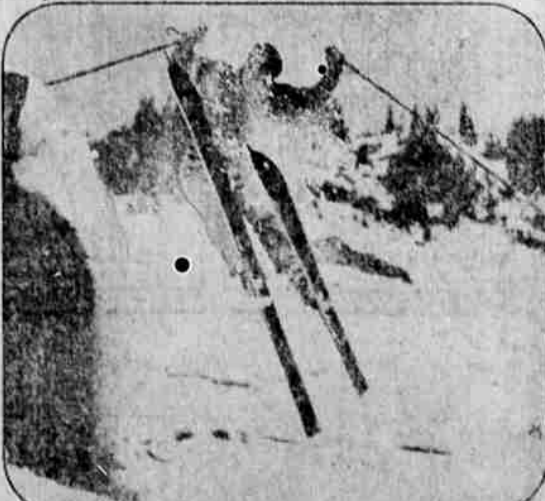
NOT ALL JAVA makes its appeal via the coffee cup. Here's a Javanese dancing girl, as portrayed by Doris Hill of the movies.
