Hendricks, Bogart, and Brisbane, as authorities and her own wide knowledge of history, Mrs. Lawrence was able to prepare for her hearers a romance of opportunity and struggle, such as John D. Rockefeller, J. Pierpont Morgan, Carnegie, Schwab and Gates stood out in relief against the background of their vast achievements which were mostly beneficial in spite of the roughshod disregard of individuals' rights.
