COMPANIONATE IDEA EVIDENCE DECADENCE SAYS COL. E. E. KELLY  
"If we were attempting to prove the decadence of modern civilization, and of the sinking power of evidence would be the sentiment in favor of Companionate marriage," said Colonel E. E. Kelly, when interviewed this morning on the subject and presented a complimentary ticket to see the moving picture by that title, which opens at the Idaho theater tonight for a three days run.

"Companionate marriage would mean, in a large measure, a new order of social relations, with the lessening of moral restraints, and a decrease of the birth rate among the better and more intelligent classes of people. All other legislation would subsequently prove ineffectual. Law, like charity, begins at home. If there is no home life, the very foundation of our civilization is destroyed," he said.

That civilization is only slightly removed from barbarism, as evidenced in the very evolutionary stages that each individual must go thru in the course of a life time was further proof to Mr. Kelly, that a lessening of the restraints built up through past years, would plunge men backward in every respect.

"When I think of companionate marriage," said the local attorney, "I always get a picture of the leaved-eyed man, assisting a female that looks good to him, and then, like the gog in Aesop's fables dropping her on his way for something he imagines looks better."

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## FINAL HEARING ON MIDWAY HIGHWAY NEXT WEDNESDAY

The final hearing on the petition for the construction of the Midway Highway will be held Wednesday by the county court, and it is probable that the greater portion of the day will be devoted to the airing of both sides of the case. The first hearing was held last Wednesday. An early decision is expected at the general road fund construction of the court, depends on whether the road is built.

The chief point of contention is over the amounts allowed by the road viewers, for right of way. They reported that \$2000 would cover the damages. Property owners affected at the hearing last Wednesday, declared they would be damaged on an average of 10 times the amount allowed. Court action was threatened.

The route, as proposed, provides for a straight line, and eliminates 10 curves, and saves two and one-half miles in distance, and affords a direct route to Samu Valley district, now more or less "bottled up." A compromise route has been suggested, but has made little headway, as the county will probably encounter the same difficulty, it is now wrestling with.

The Samu Valley Grange is backing the building of the road. Residents of the Table Rock district are also back of the movement.
