

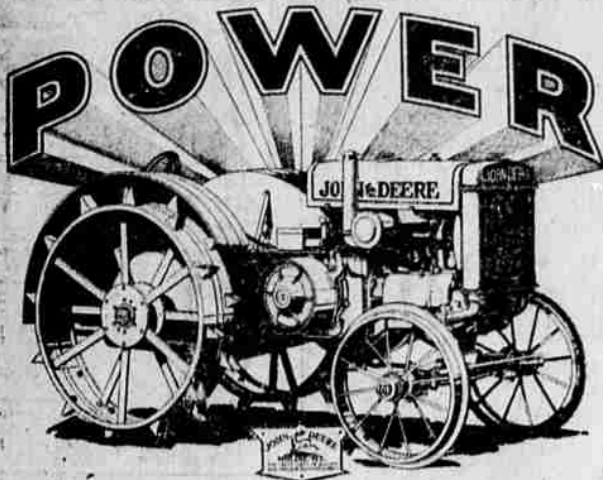

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LENIN'S REMAINS WELL PRESERVED OVER LONG TIME

MOSCOW, March 12.—(AP)—The remarkable state of preservation in which the body of Nikolai Lenin, the late communist leader, has been kept ever since his death five years ago was demonstrated today. For the first time since Lenin's interment in his great red square mausoleum, Professor Vorob'ov, chief embalmer of the former premier's body, definitely refuted rumors that gradual petrification of the body had begun. In the presence of five foreign newspaper men and foreign office representatives, Prof. Vorob'ov opened Lenin's glass covered coffin and, lifting Lenin's head, gently flexed the ears and nose and moved the skin of the cheeks and jaw, proving the remarkable flexibility of the body and its excellent state of preservation. In the sixth year after his death Lenin's chamber bears an unaltered quiet and solemnity. Two armed guards stand at salute at the head and foot of the coffin. Inside the glass coffin lies Lenin dressed in a khaki working blouse and his membership button in the all-Russian executive adorning his breast.

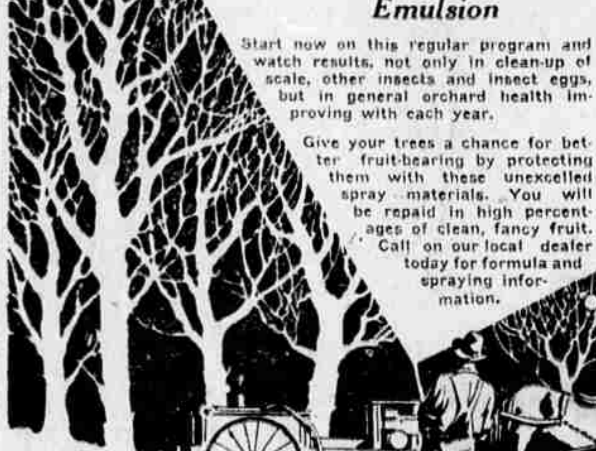
