BOREAS SPRINGS SURPRISE RETURN IN ROGUE VALLEY

Following the drop of temperature during last night from yesterday's maximum of 30 degrees to 28 degrees up to 5 o'clock this morning a surprise was sprung on the populace of Medford and the valley when at 6:10 o'clock a. m. snow began to fall somewhat heavily, which in two hours time had covered the ground and buildings with about one-half inch of the flaky material. The falling snow soon turned into a combination of snow and rain and by noon all trace of snow had disappeared in most places, having been succeeded by rain or cloudiness.

This may have been the last gasp of winter, at least the people hope it was. It remained cloudy the remainder of the day, and "cloudy tonight and Wednesday, with rain, and slightly warmer tonight," reads the forecast. No precipitation whatever has fallen during the 24 hours ending at 5 a. m. today.

The rainfall of Saturday night and Sunday morning, and the snow and rain of today while generally welcomed as more moisture is badly needed to make up the reasonable deficiency that exists, was disappointing to many citizens who have had their gardens all prepared for planting.

Of course, while snow or rain, or its mixture was falling in the valley today, it was snowing heavily in the mountain districts.

Poultry Lecture Medford March 13

Wednesday evening at the Hotel Medford, Mr. Peters of the research department of Albert Bros. Milling company, will give an illustrated lecture to poultry keepers under the auspices of the Monarch Seed & Feed Co.

picture film, which includes comic entertainment and educational, technical instructions on poultry. One film portrays the complete absorption of the yolk of the egg through nature's process by the baby chick, showing effects of heat under the brooder, as well as the effect of feed and water upon the absorption by the baby chick.

All questions pertaining to poultry management, diseases, breeding, feeding, etc., will be answered by Mr. Peters.
