FOREST SUPERVISOR OUTLINES POLICY ON FLOWER CONSERVATION

A policy for picking flowers and gathering plants, seeds and moss saplings within the national forests has been adopted by the forest service in an effort to preserve the scenic beauties of areas much frequented by the public and save certain rare species from extinction.

The picking of flowers and plucking of foliage, or the gathering of plants, shrubs or tree seedlings will not be permitted upon designated areas which are heavily used by campers, such as Union Creek, Lake of the Woods and Rocky Point, Pelican Bay, not within 100 yards of the Crater Lake highway.

The gathering of mushrooms, truffles and other edible berries is allowed without restriction for either commercial or personal use.

The laws of the state of Oregon prohibit the exportation from the state, or sale for exportation, of certain species of lilies, and other rare plants, or the gathering of such plants on the public lands of the state, or upon the land of any other person without the written permission of the owner.

In purchasing native plants and shrubs it is well to buy from a regular dealer or to determine that this law is being adhered to, the forest service says.

SIGN BOARDS WILL MARK WAY TO NEW AIR PORT

The two routes to the proposed airport along the Bidle road and the Owen-Oregon Lumber company railroad, will be marked with sign boards after tomorrow and everybody in Medford is requested to drive out and view the location.

One of the routes leaves the Crater Lake highway at the south line of the property where the National guard held their encampment two years ago. Turn to the left at the sign board and follow the signs to the proposed site, 2.7 miles from Medford.

The field will be marked on the corners by white flags, so it can be easily located. It is almost a mile long and a half mile wide, comprising 280 acres, will cost \$22,500. The report that there is 140 acres in the tract that cost \$25,000 is erroneous. Government and airport officials have pronounced the location ideal and say Medford, if it puts in the new port, will be a "key" city on airways.

Albert Gotechen and Ted Smith, Eagle Point residents accused of the possession of a moonshine still, were acquitted yesterday afternoon on a second ballot, following a trial begun Monday forenoon.
