

IRVINE QUILTS AS REGENT TO PAVE WAY FOR CHANGE

SALEM, Ore., March 12.—(AP) At a meeting of the board of regents of Oregon State Agricultural College, held here Tuesday, B. E. Irvine of Portland resigned as a member because of his appointment on the new consolidated board of education created by the 1927 legislature. The resignation of C. C. Colt and E. L. Starr from the University of Oregon board of regents and the Normal schools respectively, Colt and Starr also were appointed on the new board. B. F. Yates was elected treasurer of the college board yesterday, to succeed Irvine. The board will have two more meetings before it is dissolved and gives way to the new board.

OREGON SENATOR SEES HOOVER ON SHIPPING MATTER

WASHINGTON, March 12.—(AP) Senator Fredrick Steiwer of Oregon has urged President Hoover to consider establishment of the shipping board of a line to be operated between Pacific ports and European countries. The Oregon republican senator said that at present there were five million tons of shipping handled yearly by ships flying foreign flags over routes from the Pacific coast to Europe. The service given by shipping board vessels from the Pacific coast to oriental ports is adequate, he said, but faster service is needed between the coast and Europe. The senator said President Hoover expressed an interest in the matter.

BLANCHE WHIFFEN FAMOUS ACTRESS, IS 84 YEARS OLD

ROANOKE, Va., Mar. 12.—(AP) Mrs. Blanche Whiffen, Virginia's "Grand Old Lady of the Stage," celebrated her 84th birthday yesterday at her home near Montvale, 16 miles east of Roanoke. She still recalls the stage fright which she experienced when, as a girl of 17, she made her first appearance in London. She subsequently played nearly 400 roles in the 60 years of her stage career. After establishing her reputation in London and Paris, she came to the United States in 1848 and toured the country in "H. M. S. Pinafore," "Hazel Kirke," "The Rajah," "May Blossom," "The Private Secretary," and other celebrated productions.

Three Killed by Bomb Explosions in St. Joseph, Mo.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., March 12.—(AP)—Three persons were killed and nine others, mostly children, were injured early today in two mysterious explosions which wrecked two buildings. The first blast occurred at 1 o'clock and demolished a two-story brick building. The second explosion, two hours later, wrecked a building two blocks away. The dead: Mrs. Mary Law, 65; Charles Donahue, 10; Dorothy Gloggher, 9. The injured: Tom Nolan, 45; Mrs. Mary Nolan, 38; Catherine Nolan, 11; Marie Nolan, 16; Helen Norline Nolan, 5; John Patrick Nolan, 2; Tom Timoney, 24; Mary Agnes Gloggher, 6; and J. A. Gloggher. One of the wrecked buildings housed a grocery store, with a rooming house above. The second building was a residence. Police expressed belief the blasts were set off by bombers and were seeking two men seen leaving the scene of the first explosion shortly before it occurred.

BUDAPEST, Mar. 12.—(AP)—Members of the tragic suicide of the Austrian crown prince, Archduke Rudolf, which took the world 40 years ago, were revived today by the suicide here of Stefan Dubowsky, favorite coachman and friend of the late Emperor Francis Joseph. Dubowsky, who drove every crown prince in Europe, had fallen upon him days since the disintegration of the Austro-Hungarian empire. Despairing of finding a job, because of his advanced age and the disappearance of his last horse, Dubowsky flung himself into the Danube river.
