

SPORTSMEN STILL INTEND TO CLOSE THE ROGUE RIVER

A proposal to effect a state-wide organization of sportsmen and in due course of time, through the cooperation of the organization, close the Rogue river to commercial fishing was advanced at last night's meeting of the Jackson County Game and Protective association. It is probable definite steps will soon be made to bring about the forming of the state sportsmen's body.

William Briggs, Jr., of Ashland advised local sportsmen to draft a river closing bill now, ready for introduction at the next state legislature and in this way insure the proper attention it deserves. A motion was passed to send a resolution to Governor Patterson, urging the appointment of a Jackson county resident to the state game commission should a vacancy occur.

DRY AGENTS KILL UNIDENTIFIED BOY IN CURRY COUNTY

MARSHFIELD, Ore., March 14.—(AP)—Three prohibition officers shot and killed an unidentified youth late yesterday, while raiding a still on Floras lake in northern Curry county.

The raiding officers said the youth came out of a tent with revolver in hand and that they shot. The boy then ran and five shots were fired after him. One of the bullets felled him after he had run 20 feet. He was dead when picked up by the agents.

There were no marks of identification on the body and no one in the vicinity of Floras lake could identify him. He was 19 or 20 years old.

The raiding officers were E. E. Oakes, state prohibition agent; C. H. Hunt, Coos county prohibition officer; both of Coquille, and officer Milton Andrews of the federal bureau. The men said Andrews had fired once and the others twice each before the boy fell.

JOHNNY KERR FINDS HIS BATTING PUNCH

DALLAS, Tex., March 14.—(AP)—Johnny Kerr, expensive White Sox rookie who was obtained from Hollywood, seems to have found his batting punch. Officers found a 99-nation still and 19 barrels of moon in the tent. There was no finished product and no other attendant was found.

SHERRY MAGEE, ONCE COLORFUL BASEBALL FIGURE, PASSES ON

PHILADELPHIA, March 14.—(AP)—The death of Sherwood Magee, an umpire in the National league and for many years a big league player, marks the passing of one of baseball's most colorful figures.

He was stricken with pneumonia at his home a week ago. Death occurred last night. He was 44 and is survived by Mrs. Magee and three children.

Baseball fans of 20 years ago will recall Sherry Magee, then an outfielder with the Phillies, as one of the greatest natural batters in the game. He led the National league in batting in 1910, with an average of .331. That season he went to bat 519 times, playing in every game on the schedule.

KEARNS WILL TEST NBA STATE POWER

CHICAGO, March 14.—(AP) Jack Kearns, plans to test the powers of the National Boxing association to control boxing matches in 25 states by legal action. The trouble between Kearns and the association arose when the Illinois State Athletic commission, a member of the N. B. A., demanded and received a \$10,000 forfeit from Kearns before it would sanction the Tommy Loug and Mickey Walker light heavyweight match at the Chicago stadium March 28.

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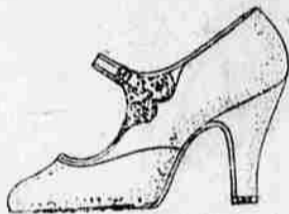
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
