So the Spirit of the Emerald Isle did something a wee bit roguish to the 1929 calendar, and set his birthday on Sunday—the day of rest.
 This gives every day in the week, on both sides of March 17, an even break. Every day in both centuries can be St. Patrick's day, and social affairs have been planned accordingly.
 Among the interesting programs planned in keeping with the popular date, is the Copco radio program planned for next Tuesday, over KMED, the Mail Tribune-Virgin station. It is to be a quaint little drama, entitled "The Leprechaun," the title describing the well known Irish fairy of good luck. This is a three character play, interspersed with a bit of rollicking music and a good share of Irish whisticality. The play will be presented on the regular California Oregon Power company hour, from 9 to 10, and promises to be one of the most unique offerings yet heard over the local station.

ENCOURAGE MORE EASTERNERS HERE IS GAGNON'S IDEA

A rosy word picture of prosperity for southern Oregon was painted by Joe Gagnon yesterday in telling of the faith he has in southern Oregon. Attracted to Medford 24 years ago through Chamber of Commerce literature, causing him to sell timber interests in the east and come to southern Oregon to follow the same line, Mr. Gagnon has not regretted the move and yesterday expressed regret that more easterners have not followed his move.
 He is optimistic over the large wealth of timber surrounding the Rogue River valley, opening opportunities for wealthy timber interests to begin operations, which would be of benefit to the entire section. Another natural resource over which Mr. Gagnon has confidence of being present in the country east of Medford is oil land, awaiting the development of drilling interests. He is confident the ground holds a wealth of liquid gold, which he feels will be found eventually.
 In his mind, it will only be a few years until Medford will be a city of 20,000 people, taking in a large surrounding territory. The arrival of new settlers must be encouraged to bring this about, said Mr. Gagnon, and he is of the opinion that possibly prevailing high prices on building lots is somewhat of a hindrance of further home building. It is his thought property owners should not hold prices too high for the sake of their own interests and forgetting the general welfare of the city.
 In addition, he urges a greater spread of publicity for Medford and southern Oregon, with literature going into greater detail covering the opportunities this section has to offer—in business, climate, natural resources, recreation, scenery, farming, dairying, lumbering and other followings.

REV. JOHN STEELE IN PULPIT SUNDAY

Rev. John Steele, formerly pastor at Selma, California, but more recently lecturer and field secretary for the National Reform association of America, will speak at the Presbyterian church both morning and evening, filling the pulpit for Rev. E. P. Lawrence. Mr. Lawrence will preach at the Presbyterian church of Merrill, Oregon south of Klamath Falls in the midst of the New Tule Lake parish which is being taken over by the Board of National Missions under the committee of which Mr. Lawrence is chairman.
 The National Prison association and also the National Probation association are also represented by Mr. Steele. His travels and speaking have not been confined to this country but he has also had a very successful series of meetings thru Scotland.
 The Men's club of the church meets for a special dinner on Friday night at 6:30 p. m. and will have Rev. Mr. Steele as their guest speaker.
