## Medford Convention Will Be Eventful One—Program Outlined

Medford is known, not only throughout Oregon, but on the entire Pacific Coast as outstanding in hospitality. On March 21st to 23rd Crater Lake Chapter will be hostess to the state convention of the Daughters of the American Revolution of Oregon. At this time there will be in attendance past national officers and distinguished state officers from adjoining states. Many D. A. R.'s throughout the state are looking forward to this conference. Many local people have offered to assist in any way possible to make the stay of the delegates a most happy one.

### STATE OFFICERS

Among the out-of-town state officers, who will attend the conference are: Mrs. Frances Cornell, state chaplain, is not only one of the leading D. A. R. workers in Salem, but is known for her extensive church work in the capital city. Mrs. Isaac L. Patterson, who is an ex-vice-president general and an ex-state regent, has attended every state conference and at present holds the state chairmanship of Champoe Memorial, in which she is deeply interested. Mrs. F. C. Gannett, of Eugene, first state vice-regent is a past regent of Lewis & Clark chapter of Salem, and has held several state offices. She is prominently identified with the social and educational work in Eugene. Mrs. Earl C. Reynolds, state regent, who recently moved to Klamath Falls from Grande Ronde, is one of the younger workers in the state, but her enthusiasm and efficiency is equal to any of the most experienced officers.

## History of Crater Lake Chapter

The local Crater Lake chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution was organized in Medford, November 25th, 1919 by Mrs. J. H. Anderson, organizing regent, with twenty charter members. Some of the outstanding achievements of this organization were the placing of two markers, one at the old pioneer road house near Phoenix for the "Trail Blazers of Southern Oregon," in November 1920, the Ashland chapter joining with the Medford chapter in this dedication. The other was the "Peace Treaty" marker, located near Table Rock, dedicated jointly with the Joseph Lane Society, Children of the American Revolution, which was unveiled September 25, 1928. Several hundred people, including granddaughters and grandsons of the men who took part in this treaty seventy-five years ago, were present. The local chapter has donated \$150 to the Scholarship Loan Fund since its organization. Sixty dollars was given toward the state box in the new Constitution Hall at Washington, D. C., which is to be dedicated during the national convention in April. A chair, costing \$150, was also purchased in honor of Mrs. J. H. Anderson, the

Ever since its organization, Mrs. D'Albini has been one of its most faithful workers. For a number of years she has given special attention to the correct usage of the flag and is considered an authority on that subject. In October, 1927, Mrs. D'Albini organized the General Joseph Lane Society of the "Children of the American Revolution" of this city. The society then had eight members under Mrs. D'Albini's leadership. It's membership has now tripled. During Mrs. D'Albini's regency, there was erected, last autumn, near Table Rock, a marker in honor of General Joseph Lane. The fund for the erection of this marker was begun during the regency of Mrs. J. H. Cochran, but it is largely

through the efforts of Mrs. D'Albini that the D. A. R. and the Children of the Revolution have been able to realize their plan. There were present at the unveiling several distinguished ancestors of Gen. Lane. Perhaps Mrs. D'Albini's outstanding accomplishments has been along the line of Americanization work. For the past two and one half years she has had entire charge of the Americanization work of Crater Lake Chapter. Without remuneration she has conducted classes in the evenings and on Sunday afternoon. Nineteen aliens have enrolled in these classes and of this number not one applicant for citizenship failed to pass the examinations before the court. In fact, Judge Corkins, who has presided at Americanization courts for thirty years,
