

STUDENTS OF MEDFORD AT EUGENE ACTIVE

All Plan to Return to University Spring Term—Excellent Record Made—Represented in Campus Activities, is Report.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, March 17. (Special.)—A recent report shows that all 29 students now enrolled in the University from Medford intend to return to school with the opening of the spring term, March 25.

In addition to this number it is expected that several more will enter the University at the beginning of the next term, because of the system being inaugurated by University authorities whereby each term's work is being kept as separate as possible, this making it so convenient for the incoming student to enter during the winter or spring terms as it is for him to enter during the fall term.

Medford students have made an excellent record for themselves during the past two terms and are represented in almost every activity on the campus.

In football, Woodie Archer, former Medford High School star, held down right end on the varsity during the past season. Inasmuch as he has two years of intercollegiate competition left, it would not be surprising if he should receive all coast honors before graduating. He belongs to the Kappa Sigma fraternity.

In basketball, Mervyn Chastain, one of Prink Callison's former satellites, won his letter with no difficulty. He was handicapped at the first of the year by injuries but recovered and in the latter part of the season he broke loose and made a name for himself. He is affiliated with Phi Delta Theta.

Second all state center year, made his name on the Fresh basketball team and should develop into good varsity material. He shows promise in journalism and is a member of Phi Sigma Kappa.

Art Schoen is slated to share playing honors on the Woodport basketball team this year. He is a letterman from last year. He is managing editor of the "Oregon Daily Emerald" and is being talked up as next year's editor. Schoen is affiliated with Sigma Pi Tau.
