

### JNO. STARK EVANS GREATER TOMATO ENTHUSIAST OVER ACTION OF REUTER

An ardent enthusiast over the Reuter organ, John Stark Evans, professor of organ, and associate dean of the University of Oregon school of music claims he is looking forward with genuine pleasure to the opening recital here on the two-manual instrument installed in the new Sacred Heart Catholic church on Palm Sunday. The concert, which is open to the public, is set for four o'clock in the afternoon.

Made with cement walls, faced with keen white enamel, the best known tone recipient, having swell shades (shutters for operation) in front, electrically operated from a pedal on the console.

The console or key desk, which is detached from the main section of the organ, and placed at the side of the choir, is not only a work of art but a product of the finest genius and skill of the greatest artisans. There is in it an almost endless amount of mechanism, extremely intricate and complicated.

There are 21 sounding stops and 12 couplers in the console, and 12 adjustable pistons, which make it possible for the organist to make many changes of stops and tonal color without lifting the hands from the keys. There are 327 pipes in the organ, the largest being 12 inches in diameter and sounding a 16-foot tone, while the smallest is only three-eighths inch in diameter and one-half inch long, weighing less than an ounce.

The Reuter organ company major in the artistic voicing of their pipes. Their diapasons, the foundation tone of every organ are rich and sonorous. Their flutes round and full, while their string stops (imitating stringed instruments in the orchestra) are made of nearly pure tin and most frequently imitate their prototypes.
