TEMPERAMENT OF MOVIE STARS IS UPHELD BY COURT

LOS ANGELES, March 18.—(AP)—The right of a motion picture artist to give way to temperament was upheld by the superior court in a decision awarding Jetta Goudal, film actress \$31,000 in a suit she had fought for two years to recover \$30,000 she claimed due her for services from the Pathé Studios, Inc. The decision by Superior Judge Leon Yankwich, also held that the obedience of an artist was not the obedience of a menial.

The suit resulted from the discharge of Miss Goudal, then under contract to the Cecil B. de Mille productions, which later was absorbed by Pathé, in September, 1927, because her "temperamental outbursts constituted a breach of contract by herself."

Fugues in the motion picture industry expressed opinion that the decision would place an entirely new light on the relationship of players with their employers. They expressed the view it might result in the upset of the whole contract system and the development of an entirely new standard of working agreement between movie employer and artistic employee.

The court held that Miss Goudal's value was not "in her ability to obey slavishly—for the humbler extra can do that—but in her ability to inject the force of her personality, experience and intelligence into the acting."

The decision brought Judge Yankwich to the defense of temperament and artistic ability. It held that artists were not servants and therefore not subject to the terms of employment generally used between master and servant. He upheld the right of artists to give away to their temperaments, their personalities and their individualities.

AVIATRIX MAKES ENDURANCE MARK

OAKLAND, Cal., March 18.—(AP)—Having remained aloft in her airplane 22 hours, 3 minutes, and 12 seconds, Louise McPhetridge, former student at University of Arkansas, holds the woman's airplane endurance flight record, as well as the woman's airplane altitude record.

Miss McPhetridge ended her endurance flight at 1:54:47 p. m. yesterday, after staying aloft nearly five hours longer than the previous record, held by Mae Bobby Trout, of Los Angeles, who completed a flight of 17 hours, 10 minutes, and 27 seconds, last February 11. Miss McPhetridge herself set the altitude record last December 7, when she made 29,270 feet.

The young aviatrix began the endurance flight at 3:31 p. m. Saturday with 136 gallons of gasoline. When she landed she said she could have stayed up another hour, but found it hard to keep awake.

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WOMEN SERVE AS GUN LOADERS IN CAROLINA BATTLE

SPARTANBURG, S. C., March 18.—(AP)—A pistol battle on the main streets of Inman in which two women loaded pistols for use of the final members of their family resulted in the wounding of four, one probably fatally. Three rural policemen attempted yesterday afternoon to question Harry McLean about a "mysterious religious cult" he and his family conducted and about which neighbors complained. McLean opened fire on the officers. He was joined by his brother, Arnold, Miriam McLean, a sister-in-law, and Helen Wilson, a cousin, stood by and loaded pistols for the two men until Harry McLean fell, probably fatally wounded.

All three policemen were wounded. The two women and Arnold McLean are in jail.

LOS ANGELES, March 18.—(AP)—An enraged man killed himself at a dance early today after wounding his sweetheart and another man in a fight in which the lives of more than a score of guests were endangered, police reported.

The dead man was Eduardo Lopez, police said, and the wounded girl was Miss Celia Arviso, both of Los Angeles. The girl, shot in the abdomen will recover, police said. Margarito Riveras, a bystander, was shot in the shoulder and guests were thrown into a panic as they dodged the shots.

Witnesses told police Lopez and the girl had been quarreling and that Lopez suddenly rose and started firing. He shot himself in the head.

CHICAGO, March 18.—(AP)—A fatherly young robber carrying a bundle that appeared to be a baby wrapped in a pink blanket stepped up to a movie theater cashier's window last night and while bystanders thought he was buying tickets for the family, he pointed a gun at the woman cashier and took \$125.

ALABAMA WITCH IS FOUND SLAIN

ROME, Ga., Mar. 18.—(AP)—An explanation of the death of Miss Martha Russell, 80-year-old "witch doctor" found slain in her home last night, was sought today at a coroner's inquest.

A man in search of "advices" found the woman with her skull crushed and her throat cut. Police said she had practiced a form of witchcraft for many years.

WARDEN RESIGNS, BALKS AT SPIES

ATLANTA, Ga., March 18.—(AP)—Warden John W. Snook's protest against the "planting" of department of justice agents in the Atlanta federal penitentiary, has resulted in his resignation, effective April 1.

The warden's resignation, which he announced last night, followed a disclosure by the department of justice.

HORROR TALE IS TOLD BY TRAPPER AS DEATH BALKED

DENVER, March 18.—(AP)—Caught in a huge bear trap for four nights and three days, in a mountain wilderness, Joseph Schneider, 45, Tolland, Colo., trapper, told a tale of a fight for life on his arrival here last night.

Both hands torn at the wrists by the steel teeth of the trap and swollen to enormous size, bore out his story of the grim fight for life in the snowbound hills, 12 miles northwest of Tolland.

Tuesday Schneider left Tolland to trap animals in an isolated region near Timberline, about 15 miles southwest of East Portal, Colorado. At dusk, he said, he leaned his rifle against a tree and started digging with his hands to gather enough pine needles to cover his small fox trap.

There was a sudden clang of metal and jagged-toothed jaws flew shut and he was caught at the wrists in a four-foot bear trap fastened to a tree by a great rusty chain, he told police.

All the while he was confronted with the virtual certainty of perishing like a trapped beast, he related, that he recalled many times a grim story told by trappers of the region, of a man's skeleton fastened in a bear trap.

He told how he tore at the trap, tearing his flesh at both wrists a fraction of an inch at a time, until he fainted from pain. At intervals, he said, he was unconscious, he would struggle to reach a patch of snow to moisten his swollen tongue, his story ran. At last, in one mighty effort, he sprung the trap with his knees and was free.

He finally managed to crawl to Tolland.

FACTIONAL FIGHT FOR FOREIGN POST NEAR IN SENATE

WASHINGTON, March 18.—(AP)—A spirited contest is reported in the House of Representatives over the vacancies on the powerful senate foreign relations committee with nine applicants for the post. The contest seems to narrow down to a race between some of the western independents and some of the "old guard." Chairman Borah, who is counted among the independents, is expected to use his influence for the candidates in this classification with a view to cementing his control over the committee.

Three Republicans on the committee bolted Borah's leadership for a walk on the Kellogg anti-war treaty—Moose, New Hampshire; Johnson, California, and McLean, Connecticut. The latter is not a member of the new senate.

With the prospect of disarmament conferences and resulting treaties, Borah naturally is anxious to make sure of his control in the committee. Senator McNary of Oregon, the new chairman of the committee on committees, holds the answer to the filling of the committee vacancies, but he is withholding any hint until his committee meets.

TO RETURN HEROES BURIED IN SIBERIA

KANSAS CITY, Mo., March 18.—(AP)—Bodies of American war dead buried in northern Russia and Siberia are to be removed to the United States as soon as the graves are located, it was announced today by Eugene P. Carver, Jr., commander in chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

The veterans' organization took action for the removal of the bodies as the war department could not do so because of the absence of diplomatic relations between the United States and the soviet government, Mr. Carver said.

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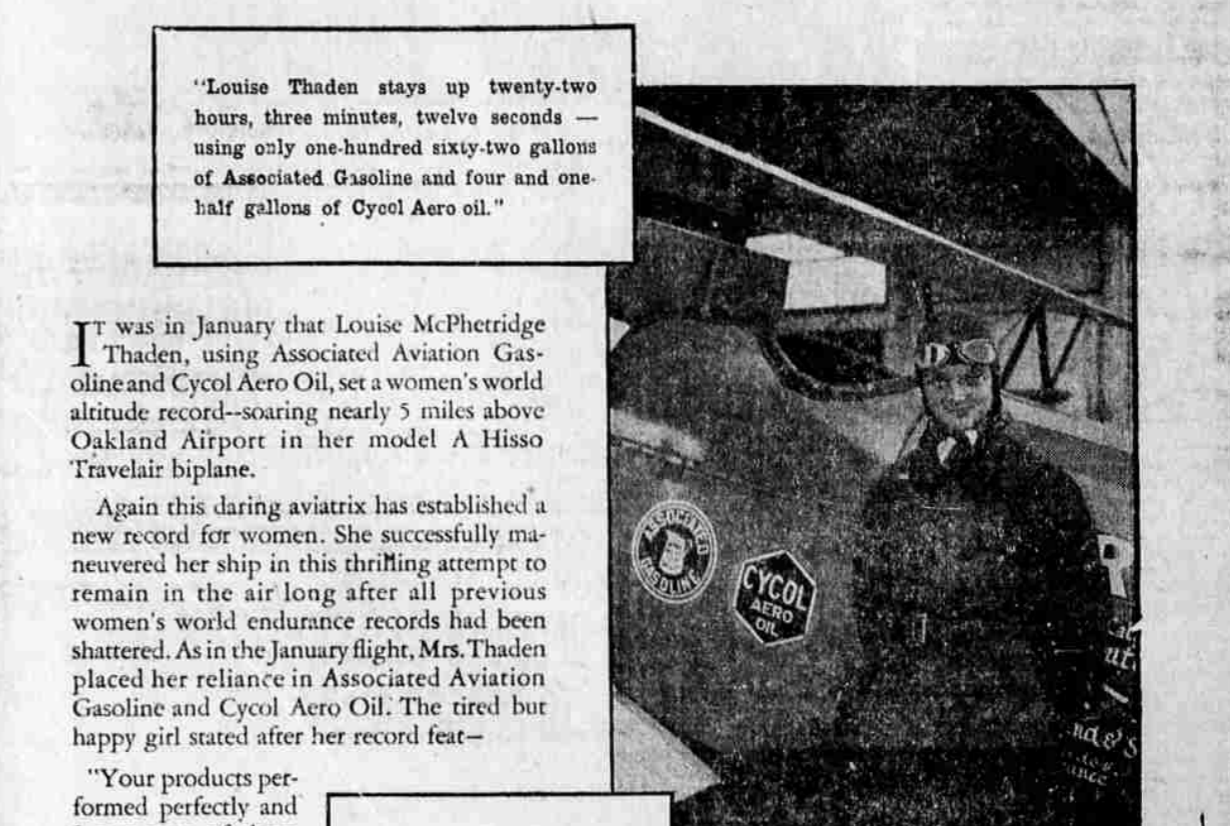
