GASOLINE RAISE DUE TOMORROW

It was announced generally by the service stations of the city that the price of gasoline tomorrow would be 2 1/2 cents in most of the service stations of the city. Many service stations ordered their tanks filled to capacity today in anticipation of the raise. The increase is effective in all Pacific coast states.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 18.—(AP)—Gasoline prices which dropped as low as eight cents per gallon at the service station pump during the past month went back to the old basic price level today with the announcement by the Standard Oil company that wholesale prices here would be 15 cents per gallon.

Other large companies followed the lead of the Standard and service stations prepared to calculate their profits from the 15 cent price.

In some quarters the move of the Standard company was seen as a step towards the end of competition between wholesalers.

President and Cabinet Allowed to Keep Chairs

That March 4th moving day at the White House always brings out many little human sidelights concerning the outgoing president and those who have been close to him in guiding the government. And probably none is more interesting than the cabinet chairs, related in the March issue of the Farm Journal.

"Of course no one is suspected of taking anything away unlawfully. In fact, no one could. It takes an act of congress to permit even a loan of a chair, a hamper or any odd bit of furniture.

"However, on moving day at the White House, Uncle Sam does look the other way long enough to countenance the taking away of a bit of government property in the form of the presidential office chair, and the chairs that are used at cabinet meetings. Each member of the cabinet is permitted to buy and take away the chair in which he has so often sat around the long table when discussing affairs of state.

"President Wilson's chair was so large that it was removed through the windows, as was that of Josephus Daniels, secretary of the navy in the war cabinet."
