LICENSES BOUGHT FOR ONLY 12 DOGS; 1624 IN COUNTY

The question of an increased dog tax is the latest problem to confront county officials and may reach considerable proportions before it is given final disposition. County Clerk Della Stevens Meyer yesterday received official notification of the passage of the measure by the last legislature of increasing county licenses on dogs from one dollar to two dollars for males and to three dollars for females. There is a two dollar penalty if the license is not paid by March 1 of every year.

In view of the suddenness of the announcement, County Clerk Meyer today said the penalty would not be invoked until April 15, giving every dog owner in the county an opportunity to purchase licenses as early as possible. A recent census reveals there are 1624 dogs in Jackson county, each having a value of \$8.98, or a total value of \$14,556. Only 12 licenses have been issued so far this year.

PORTLAND, March 19.—(AP)—Harry Troy was sentenced to four years at McNeil Island, and Mabel Troy, his wife, to three years at a penal institution to be designated later, in federal court today. Both were convicted on nine counts charging violation of narcotic laws. In addition to prison terms, each was fined \$10.

LOCAL BANK HAS LATEST INVENTION

The first installation in southern Oregon of the new type Burroughs bank posting machine, perfected less than six months ago, is being completed at the First National bank. Three machines are being installed under the direction of L. W. Woodin of Eugene, agency manager for the Burroughs company, and A. F. Croup, sales manager for Jackson, Josephine and Siskiyou counties.

The new equipment has three distinct improvements, adding to the efficiency and speed of the bookkeeping department of the bank. The posting operation is made less of an effort through new type construction. A detailed journal facilitates checking any possible errors and the automatic accumulation of totals of checks, deposits and new balances is a new feature of especial worth, doing away with the special taking of a daily proof.

A new type carriage is another feature speeding up the posting operation, making it possible for bank employes to complete work in a shorter time.

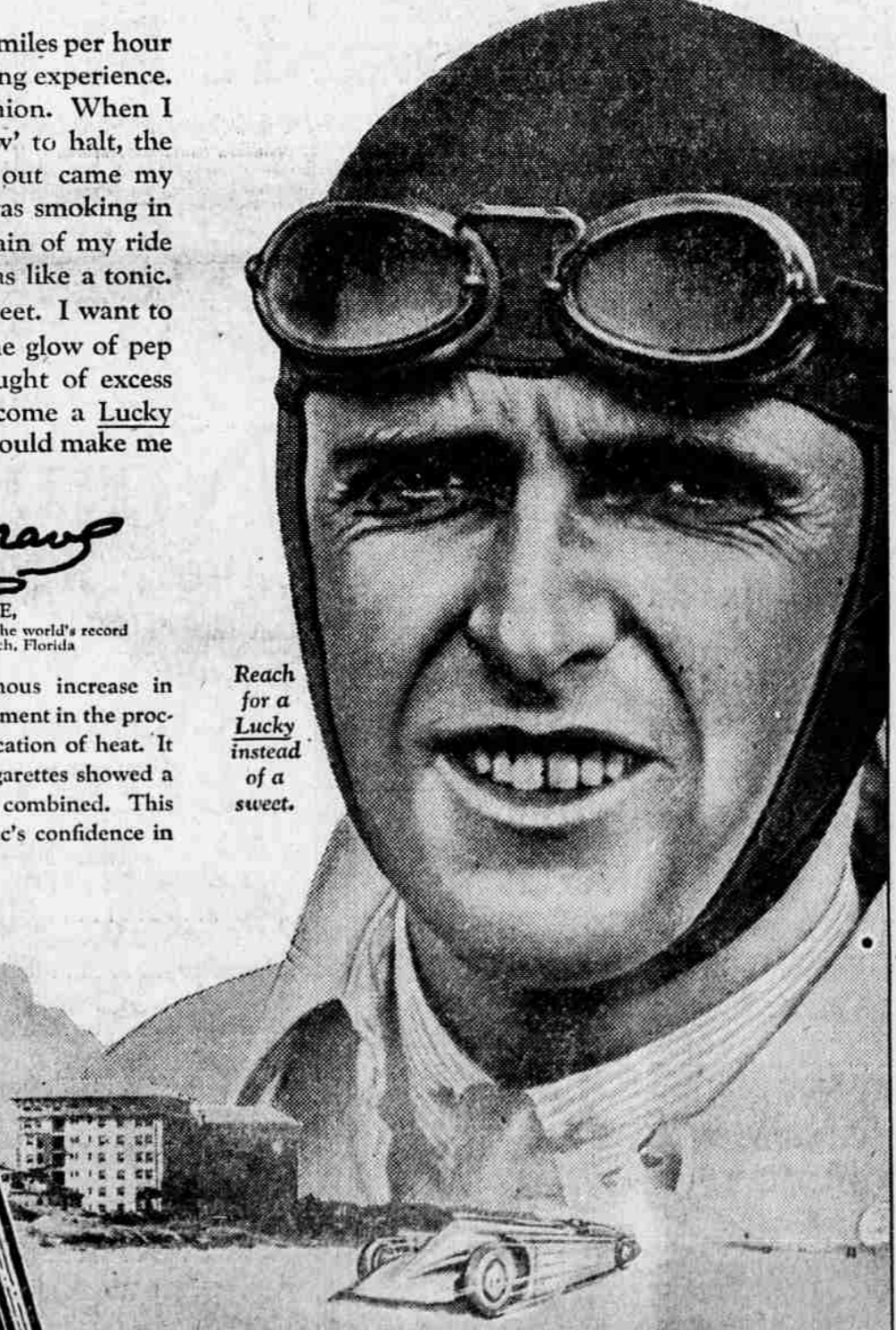
