SCHOOL FESTIVAL BASED ON PEARS PLANNED IN MAY

A year festival, interpreting the local industry, in songs, dances, pantomimes and music, to be enacted by children from the various city schools in some appropriate outdoor location, is the plan which Miss Maud Barriger, physical education instructor, will carry out in Medford this year, in place of the regular May festival.

Because of the local appeal, and the outside publicity such an entertainment project would attract to Medford and the Rogue River valley, the school board may present the plan before the chamber of commerce and other civic organizations, whose co-operation will be enlisted in its support.

As rose festivals, cherry, strawberry and other carnivals represent certain well known commodities, a year festival is thought by local officials to express Medford and southern Oregon more

than any celebration that could be presented here.

A complete program, with the various numbers significant of the year industry in all its stages, has been worked out by Miss Barriger, as well as the musical accompaniments, for both group acts and solo presentations.

These birds are jet black in color and are a very large breed. The pullets which are not grown yet weigh seven pounds, while the cock weights nine. Mr. Lockwood has no eggs to sell but will set every egg the hens lay. From six pullets he gets five and six eggs. The eggs are a rich brown in color and are large size.
