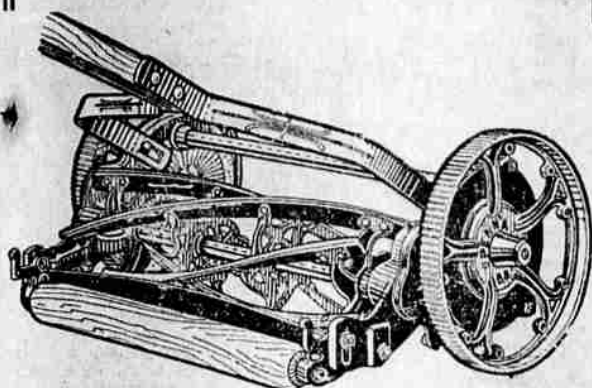

HEALTH ASSOCIATION WILL CONDUCT DRIVE FOR MEMBERS IN MAY

Due to the varied and prominent activities of the Jackson County Public Health association this winter, inquiry are being made concerning the membership of this organization.

Heretofore, the annual drive for membership has been held in April, but since the health work deals so much with children, it was decided by the executive committee to conduct the drive this

first two weeks in May beginning in National Child Health week.

It has been the custom of the association to put on a publicity campaign at that time through the press and over KJMED to tell the people of the county about local health work.

With the interest of the communities aroused to the accomplishments and future plans and needs of public health work, it will be a suitable time to acquire new members as well as to renew the old ones.

The annual memberships are 50 cents and are used to pay for the dental clinic, sick room supplies, and equipment for the children's conferences and clinics held by the county health unit.

Last April, 740 memberships were secured throughout the county by the nine health groups located in Ashland, Talent, Phoenix Jacksonville, Medford, Central Point, Gold Hill, Eagle Point, and Butte Falls. But it is hoped that out of a population of about 25,000 the memberships can be at least doubled this year.

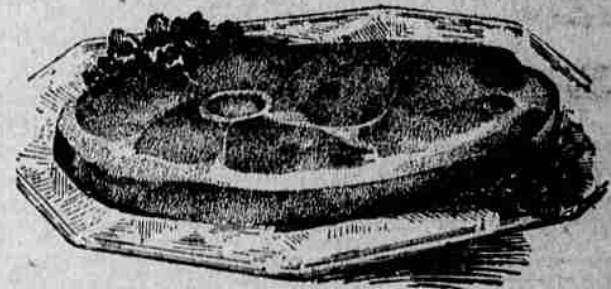
