Interesting Meeting Wednesday Study Club
 The Wednesday Study club met at the library on March 29 for regular session. Mrs. Grey, the president, called attention of the club to the musical treat in store for Medford sponsored by the Lions — the Russian choir.
 Mrs. Pickel reviewed the book, "Skyward," by Commander Byrd. The contagious enthusiasm for this brave and audacious aviator and deep appreciation of his modest and generous praise of his subordinates endeared him to her hearers.
 By a clever use of the "forward" Mrs. Pickel brought out that the polar and trans-Atlantic flights were mere incidents in years of service to country and science, during which time Byrd was cited 20 awards and received the four highest awards of medals. At all times he has deplored speed tests but en-

couraged endurance flights and the use of the airplane for commerce, exploration and research.
 The description of the North Pole flight and of the present Antarctic expedition was interesting and enlightening. The dog sledging with the mournful drone of huskies, the wondrous play of light on the vast ice expanse, the bulk of scientific equipment and food supplies against the background of blizzards and uncharted miles, make a vivid picture. Mrs. Pickel called attention to Commander Byrd's repeated praise of Floyd Bennett and in fact of all men under him.
 Mrs. Alford's paper on polar exploration was both instructive and entertaining. She traced briefly through 400 years of history the change in belief regarding the weather conditions and geographic contours at the poles. She cited explorations successful or tragic. She told of the need of short routes, methods of search pursued by different nations and times, of ancient maps and stories. However, the outstanding feature of the paper to most of the hearers was the well explained value polar exploration and charting has to the science of meteorology and hence to the world at large in its practical application in weather forecasting.
 Mrs. Hodges gave a comprehensive discussion of the magazine, "Travel." She called attention to the beauty of illustration and the wide scope of its articles. She mentioned in particular the article on the Chinese city in San Francisco, Chinese commercially but American truly, the opera, the Oriental flapper and the adaptation of modern utilities.
