The home economics had two cake-walks, Ed Robison winning one cake and Miss Eleanor Powers the other. They also served delicious refreshments.

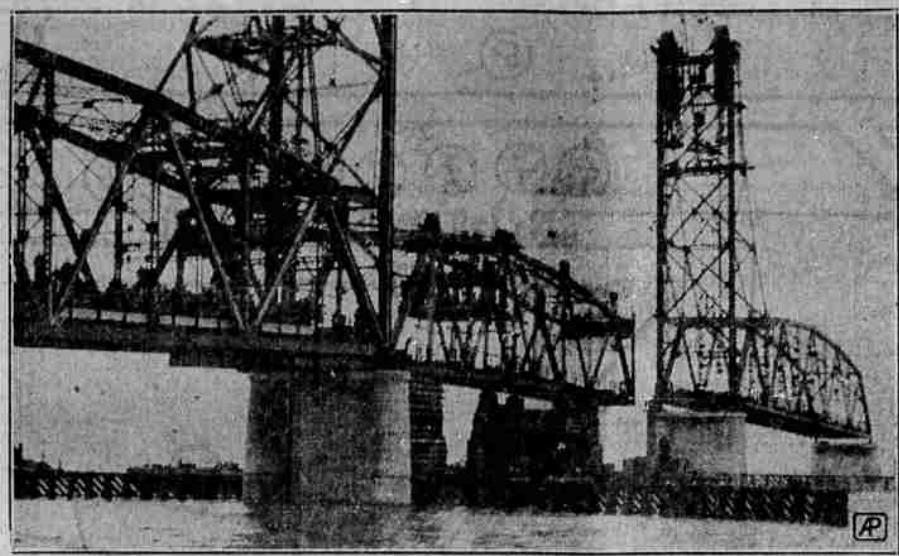

YANKEE AVIATOR FORCED TO LAND, HELD BY REBELS

NOGALES, Ariz., March 25.—(AP)—An American aviator, "Buzz" Morrison of Reno, Nevada, today was held by the Mexican rebels in Nogales, Sonora, awaiting his expected surrender to American officials here.

Morrison, who had been flying the sole airplane possessed by Mexican officials at Naco, Sonora, was captured Saturday afternoon at La Noria, Sonora, inside the rebel lines as the result of being forced down while making a scouting tour.

Negotiations by Mayor Harry Karns of Nogales with rebel headquarters across the border here are expected to effect his release. Meanwhile he had given the Associated Press a message for his parents in Reno, telling them he was all right and being treated royally by the rebels.

Information from Naco, federal stronghold in Sonora, said that Morrison had announced his resignation from employment in the Mexican service, but a few hours before his forced landing and capture. He had declined to take General Augustino Olachea, second in command of the Naco federalists, aloft on a scouting trip. However, in the absence of another pilot, Morrison consented to make a reconnoitering flight, but insisted on going alone.

Black in Tanganyika.
TABORA, Tanganyika, March 24.—(AP)—(Delayed)—Van Lear Black, Baltimore publisher, arrived here by airplane from Brooklyn, N. Y., today, after having been held up there on his return flight from Capetown to England with a sick crew.

VERA CRUZ, Mexico.—(AP)—Students of the preparatory school here protested against compulsory military training. They induced the state secretary of education to abolish it.

TOKYO.—(AP)—Ninety-three per cent of the families in Japan must keep their living costs within \$50 monthly. The average Japanese family includes five persons.

FLORENCE, Italy.—(AP)—A theater guild of a new sort, "Friends of the Moral Theater," has been sponsored by Cardinal Mistrangelo, archbishop of Florence. Its aim is to endorse moral plays and boycott those it considers immoral.

BUDAPEST.—(AP)—Several hundred French priests, nuns and Christian brothers are ready to leave Hungary as soon as the French parliament restores their property. They were forced out of France in 1905 by the Combes cabinet's action against religious orders.

ASHLAND COUPLE ATTEND FUNERAL OF DROWNED SON

PORTLAND, March 25.—(AP)—Funeral services were held here today for Robert Haney, 25-year-old musician, whose body was found in the Willamette river Friday. He disappeared in the early hours of the morning of February 19.

A motherly little woman with gray hair and a kindly face walked the banks of the river yesterday. They were Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Haney of Ashland, parents of the musician. Separated 14 years ago, the couple were reunited by the death of the boy.

Yesterday they searched the river banks for some clue to the spot where their son drove his automobile off a pier or a street into the water. It is presumed he met death in this manner, as his automobile, too, has disappeared. There were no marks of violence on his body.

The parents of the musician were accompanied to Portland by a son, Lloyd, and a daughter, Mrs. Vivian Thomas.

No inquest will be held.

SPANISH DICTATOR WOULD QUIT POST

MADRID, March 25.—(AP)—Primo de Rivera, chief of the Spanish dictatorship, feels that he is no longer young enough to remain at the head of the present regime. The dictator has issued a semi-official note foretelling a change in government and stating that he was not young enough to continue for another five years at his post.

Had he been younger the man who has been virtually dictator of Spain since the autumn of 1923, said he would have asked King Alfonso to continue his confidence in him for another five years.

SEATTLE HIGHWAY ACCIDENTS FATAL FOR 3 ON SUNDAY

SEATTLE, Mar. 25.—(AP)—Three deaths were caused by highway accidents in the city and two others perhaps fatally injured in automobile accidents in and near Seattle yesterday.

The dead: C. C. Tolson, state highway patrolman.

Mrs. Russell McCurdy, wife of a Seattle physician.

Robert Kirk, 7 years old.

Mrs. McCurdy was fatally injured and her husband suffered critical injuries when a speeding automobile which had pulled out of the line of traffic forced their car into the side of another.

Patrolman Tolson died from three skull fractures when his motorcycle was struck by a car driven by John Dougher, of Eugene, Ore. Charles Bellmer, Dougher's companion, and Dougher were arrested.

The Kirk boy was killed when a car containing four youths crashed into him and his mother. The woman was badly injured.

An unidentified woman was critically injured when struck by another machine.

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 25.—(AP)—Death rode yesterday with Harold Grutze, 19, and today he was charged with involuntary manslaughter. Eugene J. Morris, motorcycle racer and visitor from San Jose, Cal., and Louise Herbert, 18, are dead. They were killed when Grutze drove his roadster into the rear car of an Oregon Electric freight train. He was arrested on an involuntary manslaughter charge and for driving with four in the front seat.

In the front seat were Miss Herbert, Morris, Winnie DeGrote and Grutze. In the rumble seat were Miss Toddy O'Day and Fay Holly, 19 years.

Police said young Grutze admitted to them that he had been drinking, and that his party had purchased a gallon of liquor from a "wine joint."

ARREST TEACHER FOR GIRL'S DEATH

HAMILTON, Ont., March 25.—(AP)—A high school teacher was under arrest today, while police investigated the death of a 20-year-old girl in his apartment.

Miss Eva Coleman, a stenographer, died in the apartment of Harold Niece, after eating candy. Niece was arrested on a technical charge of vagrancy.

He told police the girl came to his rooms yesterday and asked him to marry her. He said he told her he was married, and left the room. When he returned he said she was eating candy, and a few minutes later became violently ill. Niece summoned a physician, but the girl died before she could be removed to a hospital.
