

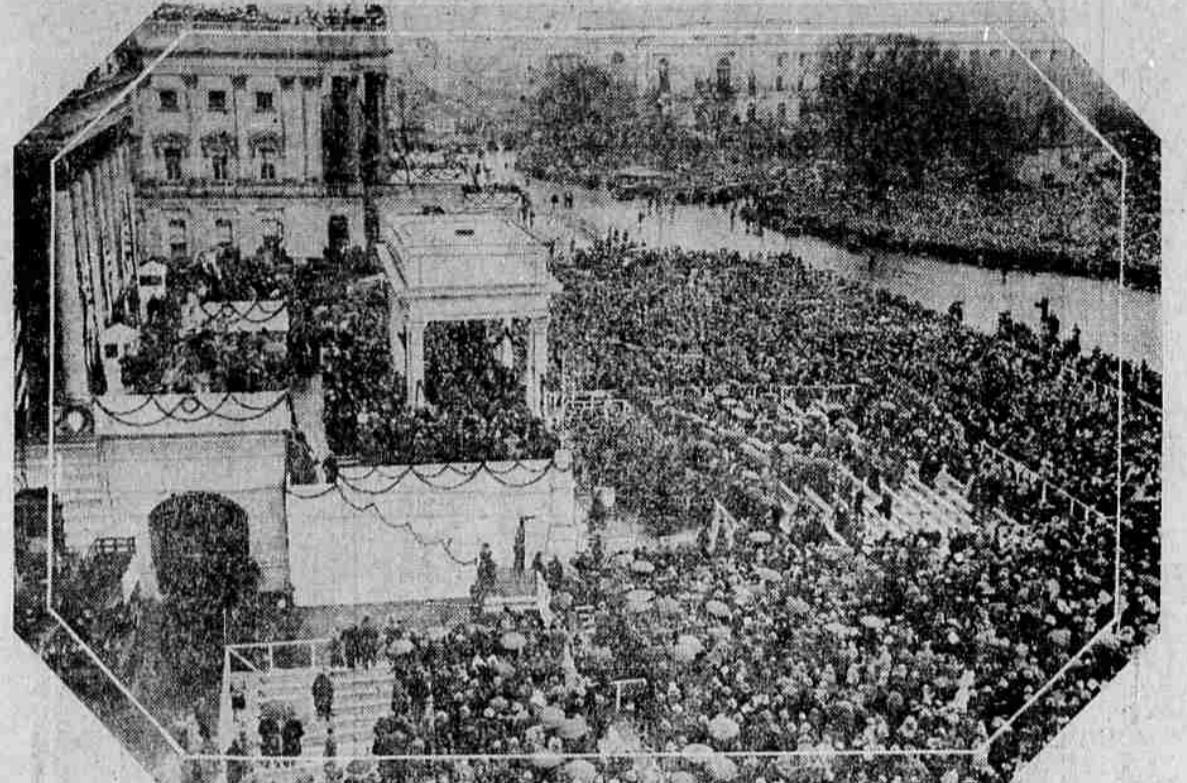
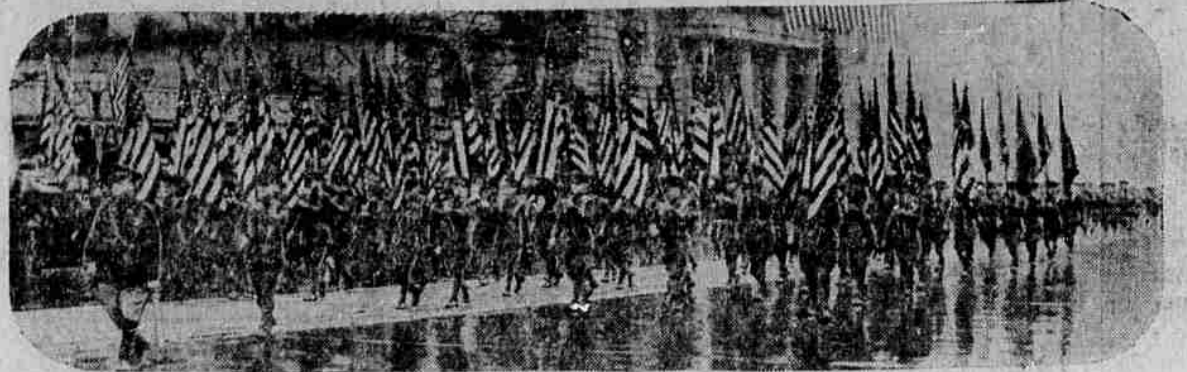

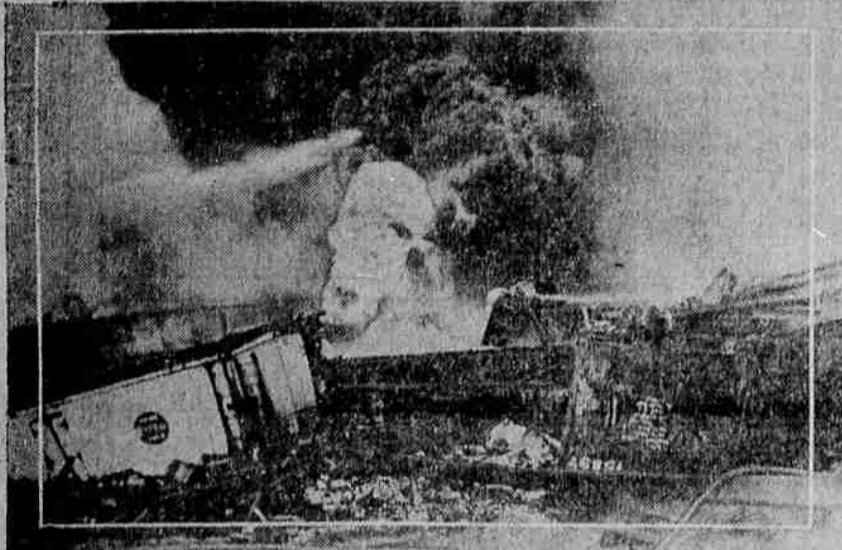

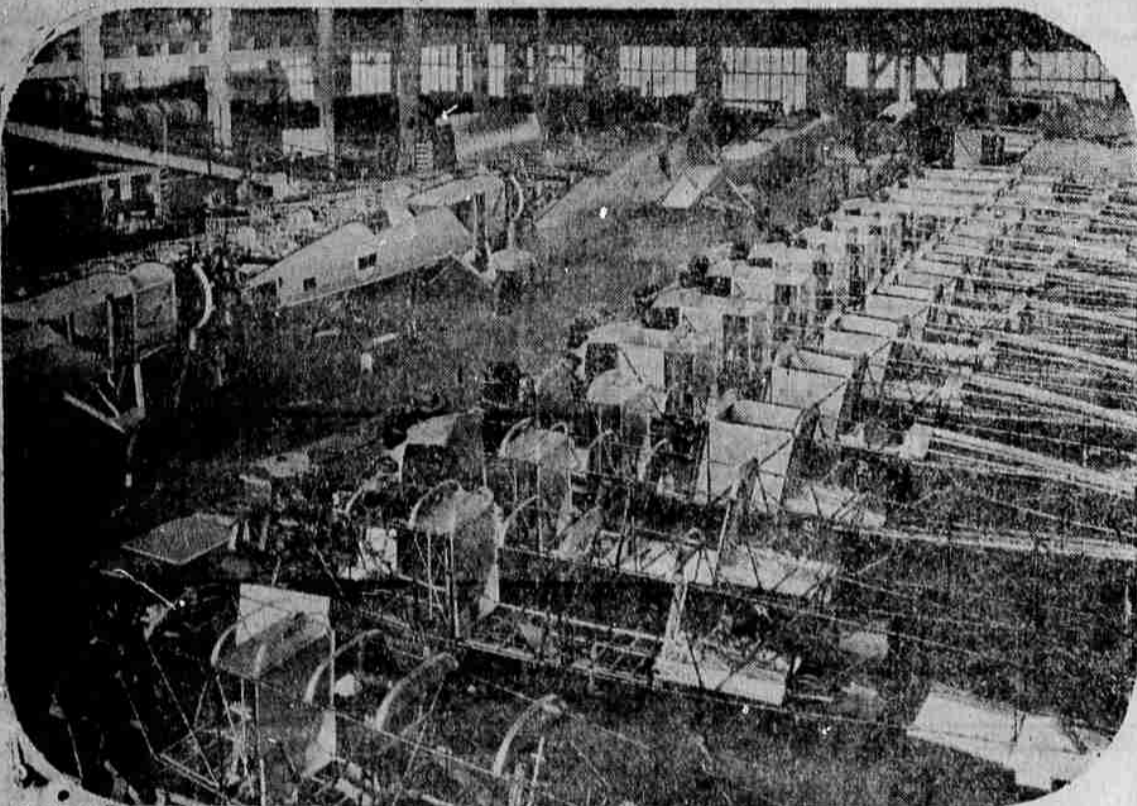

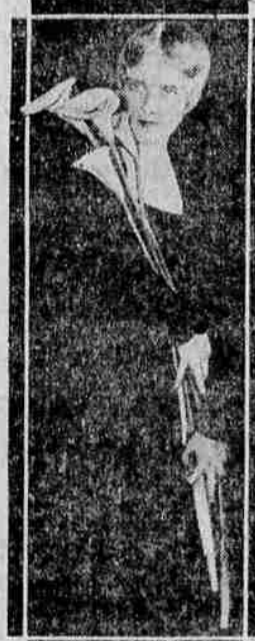

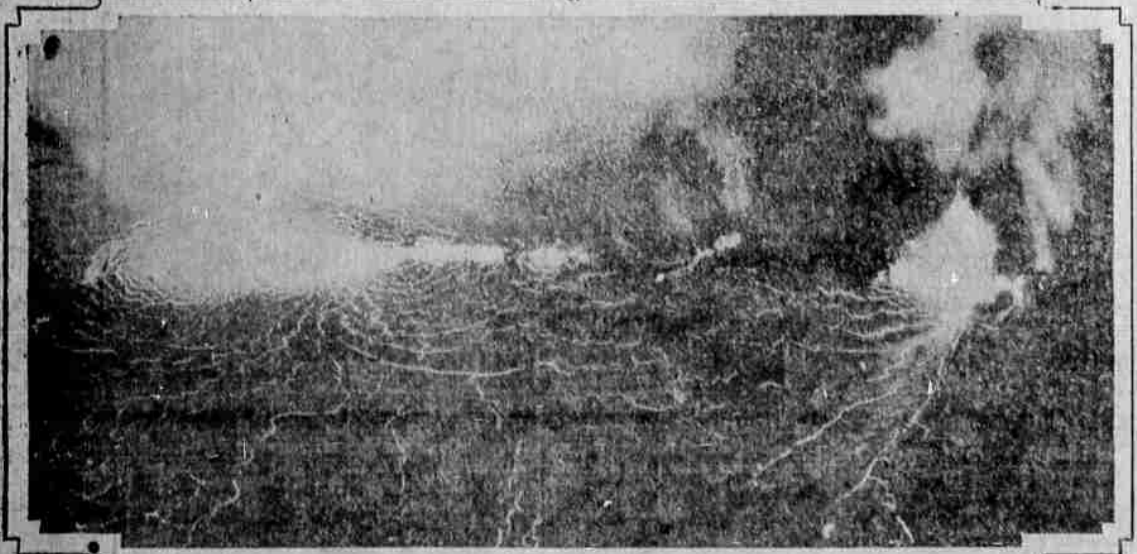

EASTER lilies are timely just now—and here's Ruth Taylor, film star, showing that they're extremely useful in the matter of setting off feminine beauty.



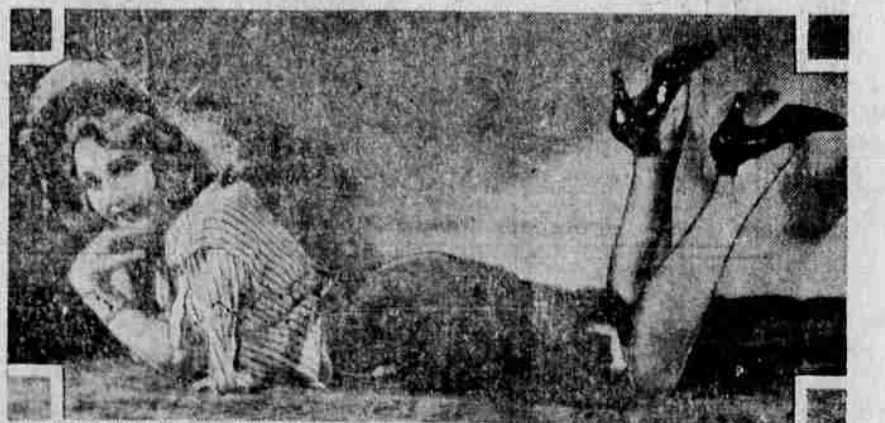
