

SAN FRANCISCAN PLANS VACATION HOME NEAR TRAIL

J. Fred Bowie of San Francisco, a railroad attorney of national reputation, has purchased a portion of the Dick Vinson ranch near Trail, on the upper Rogue river, and will build thereon at once a summer home to cost \$10,000. It will be a sportsmen's retreat, where Bowie, himself an ardent fisherman, will entertain his brothers of the rod and reel.

Bowie plans to spend the week-ends this summer and fall at the place, making the trip from San Francisco by airplane.

Inside the summer home, Bowie will build a rigid suspension bridge across Rogue river, a garage, and a dining room, kitchen, and servant quarters, apart from the main building.

The site is located two or three miles above Trail, close to the Crater-Lake highway, and the summer home will be constructed upon a bluff commanding a view of the river.

The house will be built along ocean architectural lines, providing two suites, with a large living room and a mammoth fireplace. A porch will surround the front of the building, with grounds and tennis court in the rear.

The deal for the site was closed yesterday by Carl S. Tunny, and work on the beautiful summer home will start at an early date.

COOS TIMBER BRINGS GOOD PRICE AT SALE ASHLAND MAN BIDDER

ROSEBURG, Ore., March 26.—(AP) A Coos county tract of nearly 1,500,000 feet of Port Orford cedar brought \$36,072 at the government timber sale here yesterday, in the face of competitive bidding. The price was nearly double the amount asked by the government. The sale returned \$128,464.93, and 21 tracts were sold in Lane, Benton, Polk, Douglas, Yamhill, Linn, Coos, Klamath, Josephine, Clackamas and Columbia counties.

MEEKER MOURNED BY TEAM MATES

ORLANDO, Fla., March 26.—(AP) The Cincinnati Reds were idle today in mourning for Roy Meeker, 28, stocky little left handed pitcher who succumbed to a heart attack two hours after working out with his team mates on Tinker field yesterday.

Meeker had been suffering with neuritis in his pitching arm, but manager Jack Hendricks permitted him a short workout in the belief the sun might help. When he arrived at the hotel Meeker complained of pains in his chest, and died after Dr. J. C. Chappel had twice administered hypodermics.

He came to the Reds from the

Portland club of the Coast league, where he had been sent by the Philadelphia Athletics in 1926. Meeker is survived by his widow and an 8-year-old, who live in Kansas City.

BLOCK IN DORRIS IS BURNED TODAY

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., March 26.—(AP) Damage of \$25,000 resulted this morning when a fire razed a business block in Dorris, Cal. A restaurant and pool hall operated by E. Hearl, and a barber shop owned by J. D. Garvin were destroyed.

Twenty men on the second floor of the pool hall escaped although several tardy ones were slightly burned. The origin of the blaze is unknown.

BUCKY HARRIS BOOSTS CUBS AS BEST CLUB

TUCSON, Ariz., March 26.—(AP) Manager Bucky Harris calls the 1929 edition of the Chicago Cubs the "greatest ball club I have ever seen placed on a field."

Harris said his compliment was not caused entirely by the five straight games the Cubs won over his Detroit Tigers, but because of its balanced pitching staff and heavy hitters.

"That includes the New York Yankees, too," Harris explained.

BIG GERMAN SHIP VICTIM OF BLAZE
