ANONYMOUS CLUES ON DOG POISONING SLOWS UP SEARCH

The Jackson County Humane society has received reports of the devilishness of dog poisoners, butasmuch as the complaints have been made by mail, without the author signing their name, the humane society is unable to take the steps it would like to.

A complaint of this nature was received yesterday by Mrs. Sidney Richardson, secretary and treasurer of the society. It told of the death of a dog on Austin street from ground glass, and charged that poisoned brains were being scattered about for chickens, as a protective measure for flower beds and gardens. The writer refused to give his name, so the society is unable to take any action.

The humane society desires the public to understand that any information it receives is kept in strictest secrecy.

"The society will spend every cent in its treasury to punish a dog poisoner," said Mrs. Richardson. "In this Austin street case we are completely in the dark and have no place to begin to collect evidence, and so we are handicapped. If the party who wrote about the case will furnish their name, so we can get necessary data, the society will investigate the case thoroughly."

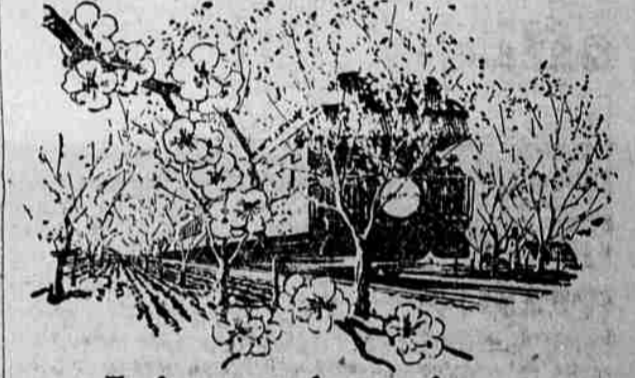
