**ASHLAND TORN BY DISAGREEMENT ON AUTO FUEL PRICE**

While the gasoline price has been settled in Medford at 27 1/2c per gallon, a gasoline war is still reported raging in Ashland and is said to be reaching serious proportions among the gas dealers of that city. Three dealers, H. L. Claycomb, Dan Kay and Harry McNair, according to C. F. Phillips, Texaco products representative of that city, are selling gasoline at 22 cents per gallon.

Mr. Phillips related this afternoon that at a big chamber of commerce meeting in Ashland Monday evening, Mr. Claycomb, president of the chamber, spoke on cooperation and advised all citizens and dealers to band themselves together for the common good. However, on the next day, said Mr. Phillips, Mr. Claycomb cut the price of gasoline down to 22 cents, and was followed by the two other curb pumps.

Mr. Phillips declared the service stations will not drop to the 22 cent level and that service station operators have decided to drop from the membership roll of the chamber of commerce. He also said lawsuits are being directed to come to Medford to register instead of stopping at the Ashland branch of the out of state auto registration bureau.

**DEMONSTRATE BEACON 8 O'CLOCK TONIGHT**

Arrangements have been made by the airport committee to demonstrate the big revolving beacon at the Chamber of Commerce building at 8 o'clock tonight. This new device, which has made night flying both safe and practicable, was brought here through the cooperation of the General Electric company and the California Oregon Power company and will be lighted this evening for the first time. The big light was hooked up by the Coast service crew today and is now ready for demonstration purposes. It carries a 5000-watt globe and is equipped with a lamp changer, a new device for automatically changing lamps in case one burns out.

It is expected that many local people will be on hand to see this interesting demonstration tonight at 8 o'clock.
