### DUFWIN TO CLOSE LAST NORTHWEST THEATRE EFFORT

PORTLAND, Ore., March 28.—(AP)—Henry Duffy, operator of a chain of stock show theaters, announced here today that his Portland house, the Dufwin, will close April 6, marking the complete and definite retirement of the organi-

zation from the Pacific northwest.

During the past three years Duffy acquired, developed and operated stocks in theaters in Vancouver, B. C., Seattle and Portland. The theaters in the northern cities were closed some time ago.

Labor conditions in the northwest, insofar as they affect theater operation, was given by Duffy as the reason for his retirement from the field.

In deciding upon his retirement Duffy canceled his plans to reopen in Portland and Seattle for the summer with May Robson and other guest stars.

The Portland company will be absorbed by the organization in California where he operates six houses and is building a seventh.

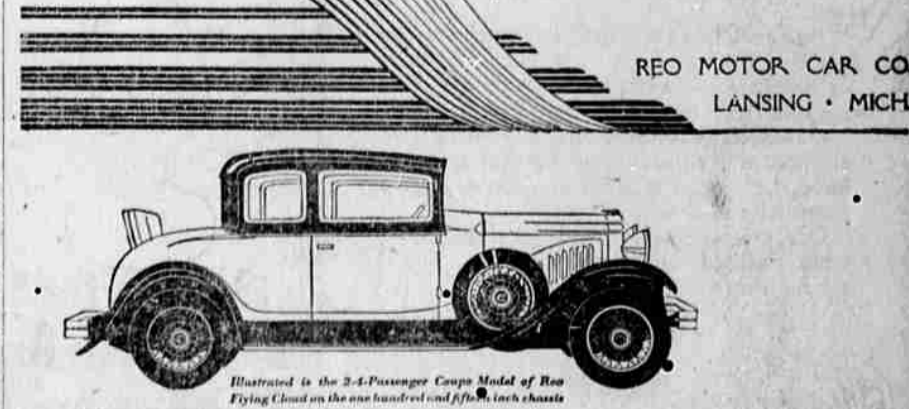
### The Rise of Ecker
