## TRY NIGHT FLYING LOCAL AIR FIELD

Night flying with an illuminated field will be tried in Medford tomorrow night for the first time when the Sander Aeronautical school will make night flights from the local landing field at the fair grounds. The field will be illuminated with a 20,000 watt twin floodlight, furnishing sufficient light to illuminate an area one-half mile square.

Local citizens wishing to see Medford from the air at night may make flights with Harold Sander tomorrow evening. Flying will begin promptly at 7:30. Electricity for the huge floodlight will be furnished by the California Oregon Power company.

A successful demonstration of the 8,000,000 candle-power beacon was held last evening from the Chamber of Commerce building. The beacon operated for most of the evening and was visible from all parts of the valley. It will again be demonstrated tomorrow evening and may be placed on top of some local building.

## RADIO TO CARRY AIRPORT MESSAGE

Every citizen in Medford in favor of the construction of a new municipal airport or not, is urged to listen in tonight to radio station KMED to a program from 8 o'clock to 10, in interest of the proposed construction of Medford's new municipal airport, for which a bond issue of \$120,000 is to be voted upon at a special city election April 2.

The publicity committee of the Medford chamber of commerce will be present and will be in a position to answer any questions telephoned to the station by local listeners. The telephone number is 395 and questions will be given prompt attention.

Speakers representing Medford service clubs and various lines of business, will give short three minute talks on the proposed airport.

A number of other taxpayers will also give short talks on the same subject.

Music will be furnished during the course of the evening by Herb Alfors's six-piece orchestra and several songs will be sung by local vocalists.
