

### PARK HEADS HERE FOR TRANSFER OF SUPERINTENDENCY

A. C. Solinsky and C. G. Thomson, superintendents respectively of Crater and Yosemite national parks, are now in the city, but for a few days, incidental to the transfer of Crater national park into the custody of Mr. Solinsky, who arrived here by train this noon and was met by his predecessor, who had arrived yesterday, with Fred Connor, field supervising accountant of the national parks system, who will make an audit of the Crater park property.

Thomson will depart in three or four days for Yosemite park for a conference there with the director of the national parks, Horace Albright. Then Superintendent Solinsky will return to Medford and actively assume the management of Crater park. Colonel Thomson, of course, will remain to resume his duties at Yosemite park. Mrs. Thomson and their sons will remain here for a month, yet before joining the colonel at Yosemite.

However, his forecasts of tonight will be awaited by the growers with much interest. Only a few orchards survived last night and this morning. Mr. Young pointed out that most varieties of pears can stand such a low temperature at this stage of bud development for some time yet, and that even the earliest of the Howell and D'Anjou pear trees, which are the furthest developed in buds, being about ready to burst into bloom, can seemingly stand it for another day or two without much damage.

He said he was unable to locate her in Seattle.

### CONFESSION NOTES OF MRS. JACKSON AIRED

WILLIAMANTIC, Conn., March 29.—(P)—The contents of two notes left by Mrs. Gertrude Jackson, widow of County Detective William E. Jackson, who killed herself on February 13 shortly after testifying at a coroner's inquest into her husband's death, were made public today for the first time. In one of the notes she confessed killing her husband. The other was addressed to Renor A. Rice, who is under indictment for the murder. The notes were given out by Rice's counsel.
