That ended the climb, as Carl and John quickly deployed his skirmishers, the former with the loaded rifle, half aimed, and both advancing about 20 feet apart eagerly on the lookout for wild game ahead, when suddenly Higalov stepped on a dry stick, which broke with a loud crack.

The unexpected noise so startled the gun man from Iowa that he stumbled and pulled the trigger, the bullet striking John's camera and blowing it to pieces.

Both in their excitement, nearly rolled to the foot of the mountain before they recovered. They then walked back to the city on a load of hay, and took taxis for home.

MEDFORD REALTY BOARD RESOLVES FAVORING BONDS

The following resolution was passed at a meeting of the Medford Realty Board, Friday, March 29th:

Whereas, the airport committee of the Medford Chamber of Commerce has selected and recommended to the city council, a piece of property of approximately 240 acres located three miles north of Medford on the Hiddle road, for the site of Medford's new airport, which site has been approved by officials of the U. S. department of commerce; and

Whereas, the Medford Realty Board has, through its various committees, thoroughly investigated land values and other features in the immediate vicinity of the proposed airport; and

Therefore, be it resolved by the Medford Realty Board that it is the sentiment of the members of this organization that the location selected by the airport committee is ideal for the establishment of an airport; that the price paid for the land is extremely fair and reasonable; and

Be it further resolved, that the Medford Realty Board unqualifiedly approves the plans of the committee and of the city council for the establishment of a class A port, and believes that it is to the best interest of Medford that its citizens unite in the approval of these plans.

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Polling Places and Description of Wards

Polling places for the election next Tuesday, April 2:

WARD I—VOTE PUBLIC MARKET, SOUTH RIVERSIDE. All territory south of Main and East of S. P. tracks, to Bear creek; also east of Myrtle street and Crater lake avenue, and South of Jackson street.

Precincts first ward: No. 21, Medford South Central; No. 26, Southeast Medford; No. 25 1/2, East Medford.

WARD II—VOTE WASHINGTON SCHOOL. All territory west of Southern Pacific tracks and south of Main street.

Precincts second ward: No. 29, Medford South Main; No. 23, Medford Oakdale; No. 24, Medford Newtown; No. 27, Southwest Medford.

WARD III—VOTE AT FICHTNER'S GARAGE (Cor. Fir & 6th). All territory west of Southern Pacific tracks and north of Main street.

Precincts in third ward: No. 28, Medford North Main; No. 28, West Medford; No. 29, Northwest Medford.

WARD IV—VOTE AT CITY HALL. All territory east of Southern Pacific tracks and north of Main, to Crater Lake avenue, then that section north of Jackson street; also between Bear creek and Myrtle street, south of Main.

Precincts in fourth ward: No. 20, Medford North Central; No. 22, Medford North Riverside; No. 25, Northeast Medford.

The polls open at 1 p. m. and close at 8 p. m.; all are urged to vote early.

Every registered voter, whether or not a property owner or taxpayer, is entitled to vote.

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CAMPAIGN AGAINST PINE BEETLE PEST WILL START SOON

It became known yesterday on the arrival of Superintendents E. C. Solinsky and C. G. Thomson, national park superintendents, in the city for a few days stay, that in about three weeks an intensive campaign to eradicate the pine beetle pest, which is destroying so many trees in Crater Lake national park, will be begun, which is expected to free the park of that evil.

This will also be the last drive in this park to eradicate the pine beetle, and an appropriation of \$2000 for the purpose will be expended. The intensive work will be done from three camps. Crater park, which will necessitate the employment of from 25 to 50 men.

The work will have to be done in three or four feet of snow, and only experienced woodsmen, axe men and cooks will be employed in the drive. The pine beetle crews will not be hired until shortly before the drive begins in about three weeks, so applications for employment in this work will not be considered now.

It is confidently expected that with the \$2000 to be expended and the large number of men to be engaged in the work, the pine beetle pest can be eradicated all thru the park during this drive, which must be completed before the summer weather comes, especially as the Crater National forest will cooperate with a drive along the border of the forest adjoining the park at the same time.

From all parts of southern Oregon, members of Santa Commandery No. 4 and Scottish Rite Masons will gather in this city to observe Easter tomorrow.
