RUSSIAN CHOIR AT ARMORY AT 3 P. M.

Organized by command of the Russian czar about a century ago, they have been singing uninterruptedly ever since, and have appeared in almost every country in the world. They are coming here direct from Honolulu, where they registered the biggest musical treat that Hawaii has ever seen. They are now enroute to New York City, where they commence their Metropolitan engagement next month, and are spending a few weeks in California waiting for the zero weather back east to moderate.
