A NEW REPUBLICAN PARTY

DURING the recent presidential campaign the Mail Tribune remarked upon the fact that a new political party was being born. President Hoover's recent executive order regarding the republican organizations in the south emphasizes this fact.

For three-quarters of a century the democratic party has been the party of the south. No matter what the principles or the personalities involved, the south had always voted the democratic ticket straight.

Al Smith, as the democratic candidate, ended all this. For the first time in American history, southern states like Florida and North Carolina joined the "black republican" ranks.

And now—also for the first time in history—a republican president makes a formal bid for white support below the Mason and Dixon line.

Whether or not this action results in making the break in the solid south permanent, it can't fail to fundamentally change the political situation in the south—and for the better.

For half a century the black republican organizations in the south have been a scandal and disgrace. Every four years delegates have been auctioned off to the highest bidder, and political jobs have been bartered in the open market.

Now all this is to be changed. Southern whites may not flock to the republican party en masse, but they at least will be kept from such action by their refusal to associate with black hoodlums and thieves.

In other words, every effort is going to be made to make the republican political organizations in the south as decent and self-respecting as in the north. And therefore give the southern white no more reason for refusing to join the republican party than the northern white.

How effective this will be if the religious issue is not involved, only the future can disclose. But that the campaign of 1928 marked the end of a political epoch, and the beginning of a new republican party, is certain.

CALIFORNIA GIVES PHONE CALL ONLY CUPID BOOST HERE

Up to noon yesterday exactly 199 marriage licenses had been issued since the first of the year at the county clerk's office of Jackson county, which is a larger number than for the corresponding period of last year, and 53 of these licenses were issued to couples from out of the state points, with California in the majority.

Jackson county is considered a green state for Californians, who are not in accord with the "glib" marriage law of that state, which provides that intentions of marriage must be published three days before the wedding license can be issued.

SOLVE MYSTERY OF LONG LOST CO-EDS

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., Mar. 30. — Positive identification of a body found in the Connecticut river Friday as that of Francis St. John Smith, long missing Smith college student was made by her dentist, Dr. Carlston W. Wood of Pelham, N. Y. today.

Dr. Wood brought with him from Pelham four molar bands which he removed three years ago from Miss Smith's mouth. Each of these bands fitted perfectly on teeth in the dead girl. Other dental work also was identified by Dr. Wood.

An autopsy was performed after the identification was made. Dr. Frederick D. Jones, medical examiner, gave the cause of death as "drowning, sustained under circumstances undetermined." The parents of Miss Smith ordered the body removed to New York.

Miss Smith disappeared from Smith college at Northampton on January 12, 1928, and a wide search had been conducted for her.

Her father, St. John Smith of New York, is a wealthy retired broker.

WASHINGTON, March 30.—(4)—The state department has instructed the American embassy in Tokyo to bring informally to the attention of the Japanese government the effect the proposed Japanese tariff increase on lumber would have on the American lumber trade.
