RELIGIOUS DRAMA MOST EFFECTIVE IN PRESENTATION

PHOENIX, Ore., April 1.—(Sp.) The Phoenix Presbyterian church was filled to overflowing Sunday night as 400 people gathered to witness the Easter drama, "The King's Highway." A large number of friends from Medford and Ashland were present to enjoy with the local people one of the best Easter programs ever given in the Phoenix church and which would have been a credit to a much larger community and church.

The different colored lights thrown on the stage at intervals of the drama added greatly to the beauty of the stage settings and the effectiveness of the drama. The music and the singing, under the direction of Mrs. H. W. Franks, added the final climax to the drama in making it so big.

FAKE DETECTIVES LEVY PROTECTION FEE IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., April 1.—(Sp.) A "detective" bureau that raised gambling dens and brothels on Portland's waterfront, extracted "protection money" and split the proceeds among the "operatives," had been broken by the police and sheriff here today.

Police headquarters announced that signed confessions had been made by E. R. Martin, 21, and Clifford Hayes, 44, who said they were "operatives" of the "state detective bureau."

The state detective bureau is unlicensed by the state and has no official status.

Martin and Hayes said E. N. Forsythe, 57, ex-policeman and former ship's carpenter, was head of the bureau. Police were searching for Forsythe today.

The confessions of Martin and Hayes revealed the operations of the bureau and told of three "raids" made by the men during the past week.

ANXIETY FELT FOR MISSING AIR CREW

SYDNEY, N. S. W., April 1.—(Sp.) Considerable anxiety is felt here for Captain Charles Kingsford-Smith, his pilot, Charles T. Ulm, and a crew of two who were reported to have made a forced landing 100 miles from Wyncham, on the northwest coast of Australia, while flying from Sydney on the first stage of a flight to England.

Rescue planes have been sent in search of the missing airman, who are thought to be down in a rugged, inhospitable country.

The first messages received here said that the men were safe and merely were awaiting gasoline to replenish their rapidly decreasing supply, but confirmation of this was lacking, and the exact whereabouts of the men was not known today.

TUBERCULOSIS CLINICS TO BE HELD MEDFORD ASHLAND WEDNESDAY

Big free tuberculosis clinics will be held in Medford and Ashland next Wednesday as part of an "early discovery" campaign sponsored by the Oregon Tuberculosis association, with the help of the Oregon State Medical society, the state board of health, and county medical and public health societies which will be launched in the state today.

Every county health officer and school nurse in the state has been supplied with educational material for the prevention of tuberculosis.

Dr. Ralph C. Matson and Dr. Harold C. Bean, specialists of Portland will hold the clinics in Medford Wednesday in Medford and Ashland and they will speak before the Jackson County Medical society on Wednesday night.

The series of free tuberculosis clinics will be held in various parts of the state by prominent physicians with special training in this work, who have volunteered their services.

Wednesday's clinics in Jackson county are a part of this state-wide special campaign.

MANY WITNESSES NIGHT AVIATION

Hundreds of local people witnessed the second demonstration of airport lighting and night flying put on through the courtesy of the California Oregon Power company and the Sanders Aeronautical School last night.

The efficiency of modern lighting equipment for airports was forcibly impressed on those who saw the demonstration in which only a 5000 watt floodlight was used to illuminate the illumination of the new airport will probably call for a 20,000 watt installation which should give ample light for landing the large three-motor ships.
