ROSEBURG AIRPORT BOND ARE SOLD

MEXICO CITY, April 2.—(AP)—Bitter fighting between the federalists and rebels for the possession of Jimenez was reported in a government bulletin this afternoon to be proceeding again after an overnight lull. The government communication timed 1 p. m. stated the rebels were hemmed within a circle of fierce federal fire from which they have been unable to escape.

The rebels were stated to have made desperate but futile efforts this morning to break through the federal lines "which have the rebels bottled within the railroad station and other small positions which they hold within a limited radius inside the town."

DIXON, Ill., April 2.—(AP)—Disappearance of \$30,000 worth of commercial black diamonds in the stock of the mail plane near here March 22, was revealed today by Robert J. Pollitt of New York, insurance adjuster, and Walter J. Dixon, postoffice inspector, of Lockford, Ill.

The package containing the diamonds was to be used for drill points, was believed to have been destroyed by fire which consumed the plane.

ROSEBURG, Ore., April 2.—(AP)—Roseburg's airport bonds in the sum of \$25,000 were sold today to Ferris & Hardgrove of Portland, who bid on a basis of \$98.83 per hundred dollars. The money is to be used for the purchase of a tract of 340 acres one mile north of the city, adjoining the Pacific highway at the Southern Pacific railroad. Improvements will be made as soon as the title is secured by the city.

BLACK DIAMONDS LOST WHEN PLANE CRASHES

MELOUBOURNE, Australia, April 2.—(AP)—A relief airplane sent out to seek Captain Charles Kingsford-Smith and three companions from west Australia has reached Wyalapa and has begun search in the Drysdale Mission area, where the airmen are believed to have been forced down.

There was still no definite word of the fliers' exact whereabouts.
