HEAVY VOTE BEING CAST EACH WARD IN BOND ELECTION

The heaviest voting in the history of the city was under way this afternoon, in the election for the purpose of approving a bond issue of \$120,000 for the construction of a modern airport. The polls opened at 1 o'clock and close at 8 o'clock tonight. In the first hour of voting the voting places were swamped, and votes were cast at the rate of two a minute. In the second hour this pace slackened a trifle, but all afternoon there was a steady stream of voters.

Another rush of voters is due this afternoon, when the stores of the city close at 4 o'clock. There will be another rush when the offices and mills close at 5 o'clock.

Keen interest was manifested in the election, and there were many women voters. The interest was not confined to Medford, but the result of the election was watched throughout the state and the Rogue River valley.

Mayor Baker of Portland spoke over the radio this morning about the airport election, and predicted that the progressive spirit of Medford, so often demonstrated, would prevail.

The polls close at 8 o'clock. The ballot is short and the count will be fast. The complete result will be known by 10 o'clock. The count as secured will be broadcast by the Mail Tribune over station KMED.
