

NEW RACKET FOR FAKE DETECTIVES SHOWN BY PROBE

PORTLAND, Ore., April 2.—(AP) A new branch of the "State Detective agency" activities of P. N. Forsythe, ex-policeman now in jail in extortion charges, was uncovered by police here today.

Ben Manger told investigators that Forsythe had taken money from him as a fee for enrollment in his agency and had told him to go out and sell protection contracts to merchants in the downtown district.

Forsythe told him, Manger said, that he had a number of "operatives" doing that work and that he could charge the merchants whatever he could get in return for promises of burglar protection. The fees collected from this activity were to be split between Forsythe and Manger.

Forsythe's attorney said today the man would waive preliminary hearing and would go directly to the grand jury.

Carl Miller, Ellsworth Martin and Clifford Hayes, held under arrest as accomplices of Forsythe, had not decided today whether they would waive hearings.

Propose 45-Round Bout

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., April 2.—(AP)—A 45-round return bout between Mickey Walker, welterweight champion, and Tommy Loughran for the latter's light-heavyweight crown, is proposed by Jack Kearns, manager of Walker.

En route to Tijuana, Mexico, Kearns said he would make arrangements here for another meeting of the two champions, whose 10-round clash in Chicago last week resulted in a decision for Loughran.

"If the fight goes through it would be the first 45-round prize fight on this continent in more than 28 years. The longest fight in the United States in the last 30 years was at San Francisco in 1910 when Battling Nelson and Ad Wolzast went 49 rounds.

Kearns said he would offer Walker and Loughran each \$100,000.

SEARCH YACHT OF STUYVESANT FISH FOR BOOZE CARGO

NEW YORK, April 2.—(AP)—Stuyvesant Fish, wealthy clubman and broker, has complained to Washington that his yacht was stopped last Saturday night near the Statue of Liberty by a coast guard boat whose crew pointed revolvers at him and his family and searched his craft for liquor.

Fish said that as he was bringing the yacht up New York bay on the way from Wilmington, Del., where he had purchased it, he saw a coast guard boat coming toward him. He went to within 100 yards of the patrol boat, he said, and receiving no signal, pursued his course. He then turned the wheel over to Captain Larsen, an employee of the American Car and Foundry company, from which he had purchased the yacht.

"Shortly after he had taken charge of that boat," Mr. Fish said in his complaint, "he turned the boat directly across its course and stopped it. On asking him why he had done so, he informed me that the coast guard was shooting, whether at us or in the air, I am unable to say, as we were not hit."

The coast guard then came alongside in a very choppy sea and insisted that they put a man aboard to search the boat, covering us with five or six army revolvers or revolvers of similar type. The representative who came aboard searched the boat for liquor.

Fish told newspapermen that although his wife and two young sons were present, the search was accompanied by a "frightful outburst of profanity and vulgar language."

PAPER ASKS FOR NEW LABEL TRIAL

Based on errors, claimed to have been included in the court instructions to the jury in the Harry Young-Daily News libel suit last week in circuit court, a motion for a new trial was filed today at the county clerk's office by the Daily News Publishing company. A judgment of \$410 was returned last week in favor of Young, who had sued for \$10,000 on grounds that he had been injured in the eyes of the public as the result of the publication of alleged libelous articles concerning himself.

The motion for new trial includes five separate counts, covering technicalities in jury instruction, and sets forth that the court erred in those five counts.

LEG BROKE AS RESULT AUTO ACCIDENT TODAY

Beverly Angle, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Angle of South Ivy street, sustained a broken leg this forenoon when struck by a car driven by Mrs. Clyde Balderston of the Kelly orchards. The accident, which occurred on South Oakdale, was reported to the police as unavoidable. The girl, eight years old, was not struck hard, the automobile having nearly come to a standstill when she was hit. The injured girl is a grand-daughter of Attorney R. D. Briggs of Ashland.

EGGS DROP BACK THRU AGREEMENT

PORTLAND, Ore., April 2.—(AP) With co-operatives and the independent having a better understanding and premiums paying by the independents halted, eggs dropped back to their former lower prices. Standard extras and standard firsts went down to 25 and 21 cents, respectively, a two-cent decline for extras and a one-cent decline for firsts. The other grades remained at 21 and 22.

Butter prices advanced slightly, extras going to 44 from 43 1/2 and standards to 43 1/2 from 43. Prime firsts and firsts were unchanged at 41 and 42 1/2, respectively.

Prices of other commodities were unchanged.

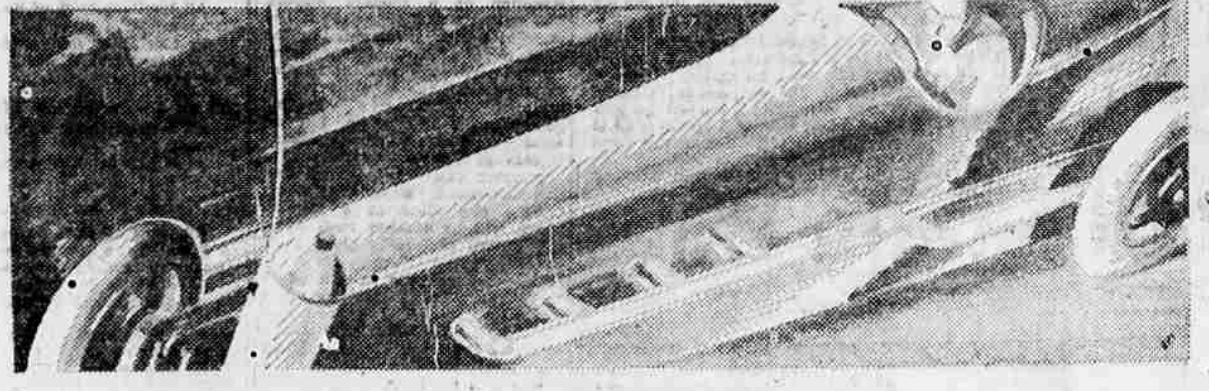

Wall Street Report

NEW YORK, April 2.—(AP) Several favorable business developments today cleared the atmosphere in Wall Street and stock prices rallied in brisk fashion under the stimulus of fresh buying operations in the oil, public utility, and steel shares. A few high priced issues were marked up \$10 to \$24 a share and a long list of popular industrials climbed \$1 to \$5 a share.

Profit-taking sales predominated for a time in the afternoon, Radio created 4 points and International Telephone and Telegraph 6. Baldwin Locomotive dropped 13 points to 250. Renewed accumulation of the oil, particularly the Standard group, in the final half hour was supplemented by demand for prominent motors. Radio rebounded again to above 194. The market closed strong.

Total sales approximated 3,700,000 shares.
