PIONEER RESIDENT CALLED BY DEATH

Mrs. Elizabeth Payne, well known southern Oregon pioneer, died yesterday at her home in Ashland at the age of 94 years from complications brought on by old age. Born on October 27, 1834, she crossed the plains in 1852, arriving in Lane county that year.

She arrived a short time later in Jackson county, settling near Phoenix, and had lived in the county ever since. She was the mother of eleven children, five of whom are living—Mrs. George Alford of Phoenix, Mrs. Ed Barron of Ashland, Mrs. I. N. Shook of California and C. T. Payne of Sacramento, Calif.

The funeral services will be held tomorrow from the Baptist church in Ashland and the burial will be made in the Phoenix cemetery. The body is in charge of the Dodge Funeral Parlor at Ashland.

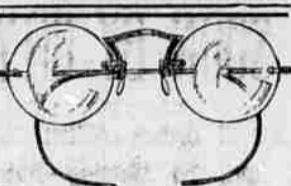
