MRS. CHAPMAN IS NOMINATED HEAD BUSINESS WOMEN

Mrs. M. K. Chapman was nominated for the office of president of the Business and Professional Women's club at the regular April meeting held at Hotel Medford last night. Election of officers will take place at the next meeting.

"Springtime" was the theme upon which the three principal speakers of the evening built their interesting talks. They were Miss Lenna Marsters, supervisor of music at the Southern Oregon Normal, who spoke on spring music; Mrs. Ethel Willis, who spoke on "Birds" and Mrs. L. E. Williams on "Flowers."

Miss Marsters began by leading community singing, interpreting

the spirit and characteristics of the numbers as they were being sung. She then selected compositions typical of different nationalities, which she played on the orthophonic, calling attention to the melodies, rhythms which distinguished them from others.

Mrs. Willis, who has made an extensive study of birds, gave some interesting facts concerning the migration of well-known birds. That those which winter in the most extreme points south, also summer in the most extreme northern points, was one of interesting pieces of data.

"Oregon, because of its position and topography, may boast a greater variety of wild flowers than any other state," said Mrs. L. E. Williams, in her talk on "Flowers." This state also has more native orchids than has any other section of the country, according to the speaker.

J. H. Stanley was a business visitor in town Monday.

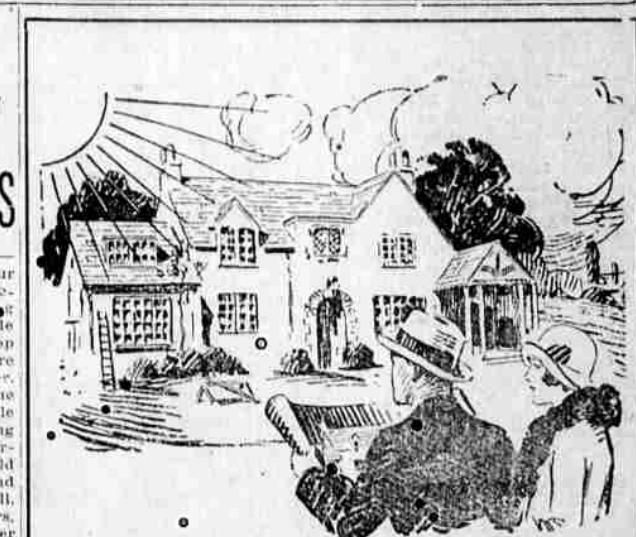
Mrs. M. L. Pruitt is driving a new Durant coach.
