CLASSIFIED ADVERTISING GETS RESULTS

DOGS DOOMED TO OWN BACK YARDS OR GO TO POUND

From now on the dogs of Medford are doomed to stay at home and behave, having no more fun in snuffling flower beds and gardens, and their owners can no longer escape taking out dog licenses without a considerable financial sacrifice, or finding their pets ending their lives through the dog pound route. All this because the county court and city officials have reached an agreement by which they will jointly pay for the expense of a dog catcher, whose duty it will be to capture all unlicensed dogs and any dog not kept on his home premises during April, May and June.

The new state law provides that every dog in a county must be licensed and this includes city dogs. Because of this fact the city will not require that a municipal license must be taken out in addition, but will co-operate in seeing that licenses are taken out on all city dogs.

The license must be taken out and paid for at the county clerk's office. The state license fee is \$2 for a male dog and \$3 for a female dog.

The city and county officials will strictly enforce this law, as it has been legally found that it is enforceable, contrary to the opinion of a number of citizens have been holding.

The dog license must be taken out by April 15, else the owner will be charged double the fee.

However, the city ordinance requiring that dogs must be kept at home, or on home premises, or in leash, during the months of April, May and June is in force, and will be strictly enforced. Mayor A. W. Pipes and other city officials declare. Any dog, whether licensed or unlicensed, found off of its home premises will be gathered in by the dog catcher, unless it is in leash. This solution of the city dog nuisance was reached following a conference between Mayor A. W. Pipes and City Attorney John H. Carlin with the county court.

The identity of the dog catcher is not known. The dog pound will be maintained under the auspices of the Humane society.

MOTOR VEHICLES RETURN GREATER FEES THIS YEAR

SALEM, Ore., April 4.—(AP)—Motor vehicle registration fees for the months of January, February and March, this year, brought the state a total of \$8,027,567.97 in fees. This return was from the registrations of 185,209 passenger cars, 15,754 trucks, 993 motorcycles, 540 dealers, 7920 chauffeurs and 6990 operators. For the corresponding period of last year the fees totaled \$5,621,183.22. For the month of March, this year, fees totaled \$494,089.24. For the entire year of 1928 the aggregate fees were \$6,969,220.87 and 232,463 passenger cars, 21,952 trucks, 2012 motorcycles, 581 dealers, 14,588 chauffeurs and 34,449 operators were registered.

SEATTLE DOCTOR ACQUITTED AFTER HOT COURT FIGHT

SEATTLE, April 4.—(AP)—The quietness of a physician's office today supplanted the dramatic clashes of a courtroom battle for Dr. Royal E. Tracy as he returned to his practice after being for eight days the central figure in a bitter fight between legal and medical authorities.

Tears filled the eyes of the psychiatrist last night as a superior court jury acquitted him of manslaughter in connection with the death of Ella Viola Falls, a young stenographer to whom he mistakenly administered aqua ammonia to revive her from a drunken stupor. His wife, who had been on the verge of a breakdown throughout the last days of the trial, burst into tears and was still sobbing as she left the courtroom.

The colorful trial was marked by heated asides between opposing counsel, which on several occasions stopped the trial while the judge reprimanded attorneys. Twice the court added to his reprimands by fines for contempt of court.

As sharply and as persistently as they heckled each other, attorneys cross-examined physicians who testified for the state that Miss Falls died of ammonia poisoning, and authorities for the defense who blamed her death on poison liquor.

The case held the attention of legal and medical authorities from the death of Miss Falls, February 5. Only ten days before, she had attended the fatal liquor party in a downtown office building where Dr. Tracy gave her a potion of aqua ammonia, thinking it was spirits of ammonia.

Wall Street Report

NEW YORK, April 4.—(AP)—Easing credit conditions, coupled with another batch of favorable trade news, provided the background for a brisk recovery in prices in today's stock market.

A long list of railroads, comprising most of the investment issues, advanced two to four points in the late trading. Texas and Pacific rose 8 points, St. Louis Southwestern 5 1/2 and Union Pacific and Pittsburgh and West Virginia 5. Call money dropped to 8 per cent. Prominent Industrials, however, commenced to sag in the final half hour under the best prices of the day. The market closed firm. Total sales approximated 2,900,000 shares.

POLAR PICTURE IS RARE EDUCATIONAL TREAT AT RIALTO

Never has there been a more remarkable and educational film seen in Medford than the Great White North, which is playing at the Rialto theater tonight, and will be shown tomorrow afternoon and night, as the chief part of the excellent film entertainment, which includes a review, comedy and weekly news showing.

This was the enthusiastic opinion of a delegation of school teachers and other educators of the city, and members of the press, who witnessed a preview of the great, actual Arctic region North Pole film, late last night.

There is no plot, love story, etc., in the Great White North. It is just a bona fide pictorial review of an expedition to mysterious Herald Island in the unexplored region of the North Pole, from the time it sailed for the bleak north from San Francisco until its members reached Herald Island, found there the bones of the eight members of the ill-fated Stefansson exploring expedition of 1913, and their camp and personal effects, and left by raising the U. S. flag over the island and claiming it in the name of the United States.

There is thrill after thrill and much awe and wonderment as the ship crushes its way past the icebergs, through floating and mushy ice, and frozen in ice in the Polar regions, with a few stops here and there to kill whale or walrus, and to capture the largest Polar bear ever taken alive. The storms and high seas encountered en route are also vividly pictured, as are the various Arctic birds.

In fact, one can gain a better and more authentic idea of the Polar regions and the privations, cold and hardships the explorers have encountered. You can mentally picture the awful experiences and risk of life members of the General Noble exploring expedition and their rescuers went thru. The fights with the huge sea and other animals of the Polar regions are especially interesting.

SCOTT APPOINTED ON WELFARE COMMISSION

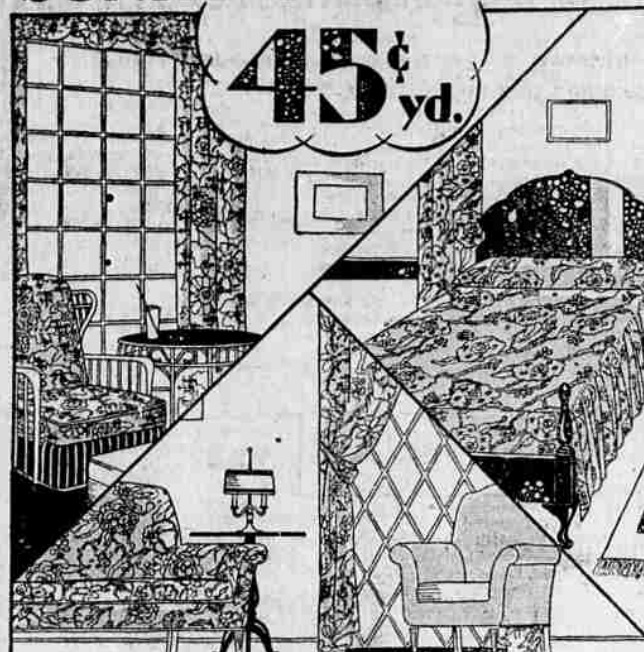

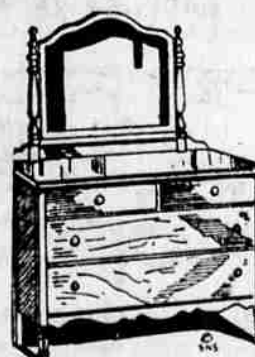
