He is reported to be paralyzed from the hips down.

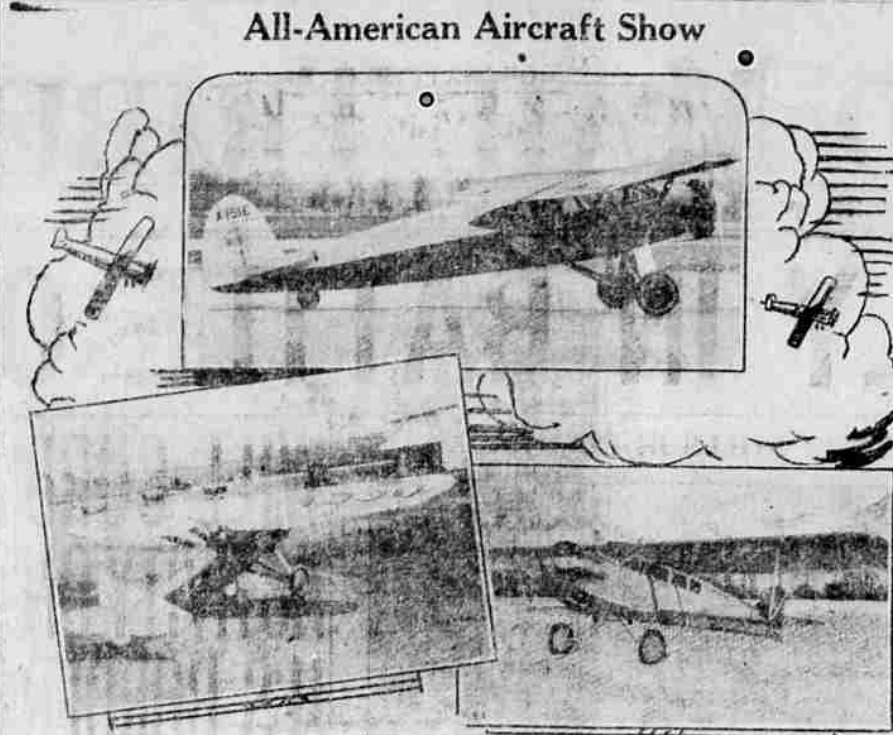

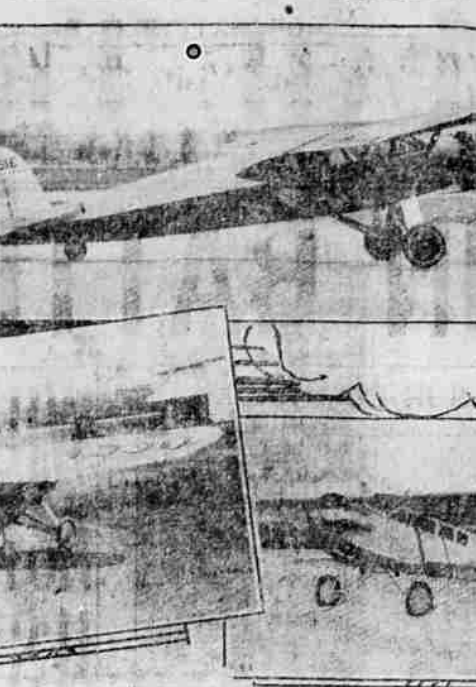
