

LAKEVIEW PAPER REFUTES CLAIMS KLAMATH TIMBER

Under the caption "Brag Was a Good Dog, But He Died," the Lakeview, Ore. Tribune publishes obnoxious claims on the grounds they are erroneous, and embrace timber in four counties adjoining Klamath.

The Lakeview paper comments as follows: "We have been amused by a recent editorial in one of the Klamath Falls dailies, in which Klamath claims 47,000,000,000 feet of timber uncut. The figures are correct except that Klamath county includes eastern Jackson, northern Modoc, western Lake and southern Deschutes counties in the survey."

"The Klamath county cruise, forest service estimates and Indian service timber acreage in Klamath county, which can be milled without excessive hauling charges, is far below the figures given by the Klamath paper."

"Probably the worst damage done by the erroneous figures is that the item has been innocently accepted as fact and printed by many Oregon and California papers."

"It is manifestly unfair to investors and to Klamath's own residents, who are unfamiliar with their timber resources to misrepresent the facts in this way. If the Klamath editor will get out his 'Ticonderoga' and a sheet of 'news' he can figure up just what standing timber Klamath Falls has on which it can draw for future operations and find the mythical 47,000,000,000 dwindle and pine away to a mere fraction of the dream amount."

Over here in Lake county we have some 14,000,000,000 feet or more uncut and we resent Klamath county claiming it, as it can never be milled in Klamath Falls."

CHICO, Calif., April 9.—(AP)—Heavy losses to fruit crops by recent frosts were reported today by growers in the Chico, Paradise and Durham districts.

Apricot losses were estimated between 75 and 99 per cent, while similar losses were reported by almond growers. In the Paradise district the cherry crop was reported entirely wiped out, with grapes and apples also hard hit. The prune crop is said to have suffered heavily.

UNCLE SAM NEEDS LAND APPRAISERS

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 9.—(Special)—The Interstate Commerce commission is in need of a number of land appraisers, the civil service commission announced today. The work is in connection with the valuation of the property of common carriers. Entrance salaries range from

\$2600 to \$3800 a year. Higher salaries are filled through promotion. Several land appraisal aides will be appointed at \$2000 a year. The Civil Service commission will accept applications until May 1. The examination does not require written tests in an examination room, but consists of ratings on education, training, experience, and fitness. Experience in appraisal or valuation of real property is required. Full information may be obtained from the United States Civil Service commission, Washington, D. C., or from the secretary of the United States civil service board at the post office or customhouse in any city.
