

LIQUIDATION IN STOCKS AID TO BEAR ATTACKS

NEW YORK, April 9.—The stock market ran into some real liquidation today, and prices broke sharply after an early interval of irregularity. Failure of speculators for the advance to attract an outside following, coupled with the increasing tenseness of the credit situation, led to a resumption of heavy "bear" attacks, which dislodged a number of investors and traders.

Call money renewed at 7 per cent but advanced to 8 as banks called \$40,000,000 in loans, and threatened to go higher. Time money held firm at 9 per cent with little business done at that figure.

American Express, which established a new high record at 499 yesterday in anticipation of the announcement that it will be taken over by the Chase National bank, broke to 343 on the traditional "selling on the good news." Adams Express dropped 44 points to 625, Federal Mining and Smelting, which dropped 44 points yesterday, fell 25 more today to a new low for the year at 225.

SNOW AT LAKE IS SAME AS IN 1928

There was 13 feet of snow at the lake rim of Crater National park yesterday afternoon when Arthur B. Stone, caretaker of the lodge, phoned to the park offices in this city, and it was still snowing hard as he talked.

This is approximately the same depth of snow as was at the lake rim last year at this time, but it has not had as much water content as the depth of last year according to those familiar with snow conditions there of past years.

However, this increase over the depth at the lake rim a week ago, 10 1/2 feet, augurs better for plenty of irrigation water and water for the Rogue river and other streams during the summer.

PROPOSE DAWES AS AMBASSADOR

WASHINGTON, April 9.—(AP)—Although the White House was silent, it was learned today that the name of Charles Gates Dawes, former vice president, has been proposed to the British government as ambassador to the court of St. James.

Formal announcement of the appointment awaits word from London that Mr. Dawes is acceptable as the successor to Alanson B. Houghton who is to leave London for the United States on April 27.

DIPPING OF SMELT BEGINS SANDY RIVER

PORTLAND, April 9.—(AP)—The annual smelt run in the Sandy river is underway. At 3:30 p. m. yesterday a group of the small fish reached troutdale, and throughout the night and today others arrived in greatly increasing numbers.

Under a law passed by the last legislature the state now requires that a license be obtained before any smelt be taken from the stream. The license costs fifty cents.

Each year thousands of the small fish are dipped from the Sandy river.

LAS LIMAS BOMBED BY YANKEES IS REPORT

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras, April 9.—(AP)—Hondurans were excited today by reports that Las Limas, Honduras, had been bombed by American airplanes operating in Nicaragua. Honduran authorities were investigating.

The reports were that American planes from Managua bombed suspected rebel camps along the border and, somehow, bombed also Las Limas, just across the national frontier. Much of the town was destroyed in a fire which followed.

NEW YORK, April 9.—(AP)—Wealthy Hank Miller, who has been selling newspapers for 20 years and sleeping so much in the subway that he became a nuisance, is to spend 60 days in the workhouse. He was found to have more than \$11,000 in four savings banks, in addition to the undisclosed contents of a safe deposit box.

SALEM GAS STATIONS HAVE VARYING PRICES

SALEM, Ore., April 9.—(AP)—Twenty-three cents a gallon was the established price for gasoline in Salem Tuesday, reduction of two cents from the 25-cent quotation which has been maintained by members of the Salem Gas Dealers association since the close of the coast gasoline war three weeks ago.

Some dealers operating carburetor pumps are displaying 21-cent price tags, and a few of the smaller service stations are reported selling at 22 cents.
