REPRESENTATIVES VOTE TO IMPEACH GOV. HUEY P. LONG

BATON ROUGE, La., April 11.—(AP)—The house of representatives of the Louisiana legislature today voted impeachment charges of bribery against Governor Huey P. Long.

Specifically, the charge is that the governor offered Representatives Adolphe Guymard of Berwick Parish and Felix Delaune of St. Charles Parish, remuneration in return for their support of administrative measures.

The governor further was charged with having offered financial assistance to Guymard.

RELIGIOUS OBSTACLES HALT ROYAL ROMANCE

SOFIA, Bulgaria, April 11.—(AP)—Religious obstacles today seemed destined to prevent his proposed wedding with Princess Giovanna of Italy and talk arose of a possible alliance with the Grand Duchess Vladimirovitch, 19 year old daughter of Grand Duke Cyril, recognized as head of the Romanoff family by many Russian royalists.

Information in diplomatic circles here was that both the Vatican and the Bulgarian church declined to yield sufficient ground to make the alliance with Princess Giovanna possible. It was said the pope refused the Italian princess a dispensation to marry King Boris unless offering of the union were reared in the Roman Catholic faith.

The various rural communities of Jackson county have been engaged for some time past, with the co-operation and guidance of County Agent R. G. Fowler, in waging war on the ground squirrels and still are, by scattering poison about in advantageous places to exterminate or control these pests, which do so much damage to crops. The farmers of each community provide their own poison and Mr. Fowler mixes it for them in the right proportion to be the most effective.

Some rural sections of the county that the ground squirrels are more numerous than ever this spring. They may be more numerous, as these reports say, but it is also possible that, while they are not more numerous generally than in past years, they appear to be so in some localities because they may have migrated to these localities and hunched up there, from other localities.

Above eight tons of poisoned grain were used in Oregon by rodent control workers in conjunction with the county agricultural agents, in the spring campaign against ground squirrels and other injurious rodents during March, according to Ira N. Gabrielson, the state leader in such control work. This war against the gray digger, or ground squirrel, will continue to be waged extensively during April in the various counties of the state, in order to control as much as possible the pests before their young are born in May.

Witwer, author, charging the Harold Lloyd Corporation, film producers, with using the characters and plot of his story, "The Emancipation of Rodney," in a film, "The Freshman."
