

LIQUOR STOCKS ANGLERS MUST FOR LEVIATHAN AWAIT OPENING IN NEW REGIME FISHING SEASON

Queen of U. S. Merchant Marine Wet for First Time in Six Years—New Owners to Stock Ten Other Ships of Line.

NEW YORK, April 11.—(AP)—The Leviathan, queen of the American merchant marine and for six years a prohibition ship, was en route to Europe today with liquor for sale. The liner will make her maiden voyage under private American ownership as the flagship of the newly organized United States Lines, Inc., and the medical liquor stores were available for beverage purposes. On the return trip and future voyages a less limited supply than that contained in the medical stores will be for sale.

Joseph E. Sheedy, executive vice-president of the line, said there would be no public bar in the ship but that liquors and wines would be served to passengers in their cabins and in the dining rooms and smoking rooms. Drinks will be served at meals.

The same policy, Sheedy said, would be put into effect aboard the other 10 ships recently purchased from the United States shipping board.

Sheedy said the company sought no direct financial gain from the sale of liquor.

Under the law ships are permitted to carry one quart of liquor for each five passengers and members of the crew for medical purposes. This would give the Leviathan an allowance of 700 quarts on this voyage to Europe. The Leviathan and other shipping board vessels were made dry in 1923 on the theory that liquor should not be sold on government-owned ships.

MONTE BLUE RESTING HOLLYWOOD HOSPITAL

EUGENE, Ore., April 11.—(AP)—Not only will it be impossible to advance the date for the opening of the fishing season from next Monday to next Sunday, but it will be necessary, according to Ben F. Dorris, chairman of the state fish commission, to enforce the law against poaching if the law is broken Sunday.

Dorris made this statement today to set at rest rumors that, despite the fact that the commission found itself unable to advance the opening date, fish and game wardens would be instructed to be "looking the other way" should they see anyone casting a fly next Sunday.

"I hate like the dickens to do it," Dorris declared, "but I must warn everybody that all rumors of the commission winking at violations of the code are absolutely unfounded on authority. On the contrary, we shall have to insist on prosecution of all violations next Sunday. Our legal advisers told us that the fixing of the opening date is a matter reserved specifically for the state legislature and it is a function, furthermore, which the legislature has no power to delegate to us or to the governor or anybody else."

SCRUBWOMAN WITNESS ROTHSTEIN CASE FREE

NEW YORK, April 11.—(AP)—After 134 days as an involuntary guest of the city, Bridget Farry, the last of the witnesses to be held in the Rothstein slaying, was free under \$1500 bail today to resume her interrupted occupation of scrubwoman.

Bridget had been at work in the third floor corridor of the Park Central hotel on Nov. 4 shortly before Arnold Rothstein, notorious Broadway gambler, was fatally shot, and since then had been held under \$5000 bail as a material witness.

WOULD ESTABLISH BORAH FOUNDATION

MOSCOW, Idaho, April 11.—(AP) A gift of \$55,000 from Salmon O. Levinson, Chicago attorney and prominent peace advocate, for the establishment of a "William Edgar Borah outlary of war foundation," at the University of Idaho, was announced here today by Dr. Frederick J. Kelly, president of the university.

The endowment was offered to perpetuate "the great contribution of William Edgar Borah to the cause of world peace and democracy." Levinson did not state what form the foundation should take.

HOMESTEADERS PLEAD GUILTY TO PERJURY

PORTLAND, April 11.—(AP) Fred Powell, George Ellsworth and J. R. Calbreath all pleaded guilty to charges of perjury in connection with proving up on a homestead near Prineville, in federal court here today.

Federal Judge McNary fined Powell \$350, Ellsworth \$300 and Calbreath \$300. Each was sentenced to ten days in jail but referred to his attorney.

BOMB DAMAGES PLANT CIGERO, NEWSPAPER

CHICAGO, April 11.—(AP)—The plant of the Suburban Leader, a weekly newspaper in Cicero, which serves several western suburbs, was bombed early today. The black powder "pineapple" blasted a hole through the front of the building, and damaged the interior.

Police said the bomb may have been intended for the Central Cab company next door, but William Cepak, publisher of the Leader, said he had received several threats prior to the April 2 election, when he opposed the Republican ticket in Berwyn, an adjoining suburb. The damage was estimated at \$1500.

Roadmaster Robbed.
PORTLAND, April 11.—(AP)—A pearl necklace valued at \$100, five rings worth about \$400, and a quantity of clothing, was stolen from George W. Buck, Multnomah county roadmaster, early this morning, police were told.

Explosion On Liner.
HOBOKEN, N. J., April 11.—(AP)—One man was killed and six badly burned in an explosion today aboard the United States liner President Roosevelt, docked on the north side of pier 4, at the foot of Third street, this city.

VOTE CONSOLIDATION SOUTH PRESBYTERIES

ROSEBURG, Ore., April 11.—(AP) A unanimous vote to consolidate the Coos Bay and Southern Oregon presbyteries into the Presbytery of Southwestern Oregon, embracing Douglas, Coos, Curry, Jackson, Josephine and Klamath counties, including approximately forty-five Presbyterian churches, was taken here today. The action is subject to ratification by the general assembly to be held in Minneapolis in May. If approval is given the new officers will be selected at the meeting of the synod in Albany in July.

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
