NEW METHOD FOR 'MATH' TEACHERS IS REVOLUTIONARY

NEW ORLEANS, April 12.—(AP)—A system of teaching mathematics to first grade pupils that is "revolutionizing the whole present system of teaching" in Mexico was brought to the annual conference of the American Association of University women here today by Miss Adelia Palacios, professor of mathematics at the University of Mexico.

Miss Palacios described the system as an entirely new concept of the subject which involves quite a simplified method of learning and probably will be ready for introduction in the United States with the opening of the fall term of school.

By the new method Miss Palacios claims a child can learn the multiplication tables in five weeks at the age of six by laying the foundation for easier approach to addition, subtraction, division and higher mathematics.
