FABRIC EXPERT TO EXPLAIN MATERIAL AT MANN'S STORE

Feminine shoppers of Medford are to be treated to a three-day fabric fashion show next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday at Mann's department store, when Amana Elliott Webster, fabric fashion adviser of Marshall Field & Co. of Chicago, will conduct a series of lectures and fashion parades during the mornings and afternoons. The latest thing in fabrics, together with suggestions for making them into frocks, will be demonstrated. Among the new materials to be shown are Brierton tweed, a soft basket weave woolen, sturdy but light in weight, which bids fair to be popular this spring; serenade chiffon; Speed Age prints, with pictures of autos and airplanes making up their designs; Sunrise lawn; Polo pique; Vagabond prints; and Ramona voile. All of these materials will be seen made up, the work having been done by amateur seamstresses for the exhibition. Miss Webster will come here from a tour to San Francisco, Los Angeles, Hollywood and other western style centers, where she has been holding fabric fashion shows. She will stop in only three Oregon cities, Medford, Portland and Klamath Falls, returning via Salt Lake City to her Chicago headquarters.

STILL AT WIMER NEATEST LAYOUT FOUND IN COUNTY

A preliminary hearing was scheduled to be held this afternoon in justice court for Tom Owen, arrested yesterday near Wimer for the possession of alleged moonshine by the sheriff's office. A. H. Rose was arrested with Owen and is being held for the possession and operation of a moonshine still. He will probably enter a plea in circuit court tomorrow. Rose claimed the entire ownership of the still and declared Owen was visiting him at the time the officers arrived. Rose is one-armed and has a wife and three children. The still was described by officers as being one of the neatest and most sanitary outfits ever seized in Jackson county. They

said it was capable of turning out a high quality product through the use of special equipment. Officers visited the still several days ago, but at that time found no one present on the premises.
