SCOUTS TO PLANT TREES AT INTAKE CITY WATER LINE

The Boy Scouts of Medford, acting in co-operation with the city water commission and the Crater National forest service, will spend tomorrow at the city water intake at Big Butte springs in planting several thousand young Douglas fir trees in the burned over area there for the water commission. They were to have done this last Saturday, but the project had to be given up because of deep snow then in that territory.

All preparations have been made for the trip to the intake tomorrow. Only very bad weather can prevent. The Boy Scouts and it is expected 40 to 50 of them will go, are urged to be at the scout headquarters on the city playgrounds at 8 a. m. where stages and drivers provided by the water commission will be waiting to take them to Big Butte springs.

Each boy is instructed to bring with him a substantial lunch, the kind that will stick to the ribs, as a hard day's work and long rides will be ahead of them, and also to wear heavy work clothing because cold or wet weather may be experienced.

The tree planting and scouts will be under the supervision of Norman White, assistant supervisor, and Lee P. Brown, administrative assistant, of the Crater National forest, and F. C. Dillard, engineer of the city water commission.

The trees, which will be planted on the watershed of the city water intake to reforest an area burned over in about 1922, were obtained by the water commission from the state nursery at Corvallis. The trees have from four to six-inch tops, and six inches of root. They are expected to eventually form a beautiful picnic grove, as well as protection to the intake.

HEAVY SMUDGING USED IN BATTLE WITH FRUIT FOE

During last night there was another heavy frost and heavy smudging, with a 28 minimum in Medford and a degree or so lower than that in the orchard districts which, thanks to the heavy smudging until all danger was past, caused no damage.

Although the coldest unsmudged orchard temperature was 27 1/2, the orchard owners are taking no chances now the local crop outlook is so rosy because of the great damage done by frost to the California fruit crops, and hence the average owner fired heavily enough to keep his orchard temperature up around 29 or 30.

Although some orchards began earlier, general smudging began at about 3 a. m. and continued for several hours.

The outlook today was that there would be no necessity for smudging tonight unless a radical change in weather took place, as

the forecast is for probably rain, beginning late tonight, or on Saturday. Yesterday's minimum was 33.

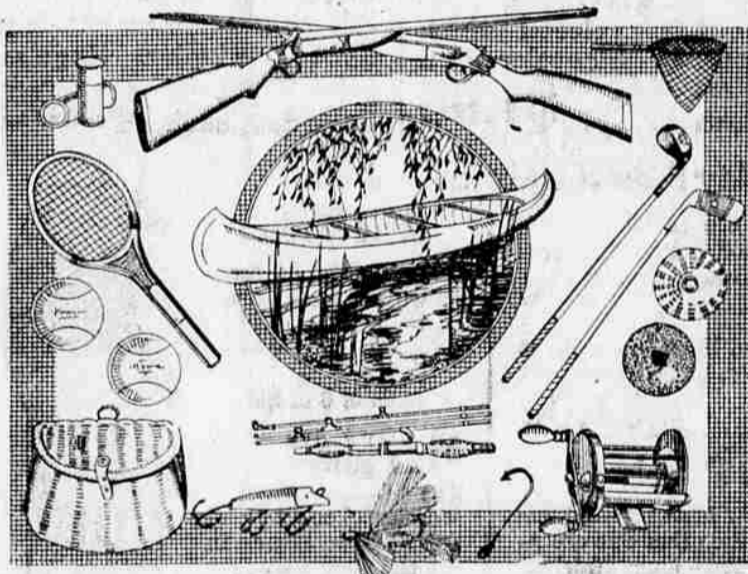

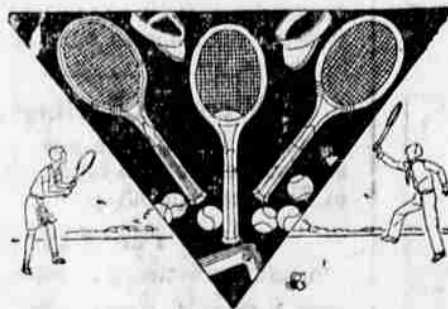
