PEACE LECTURER PORTRAYS CAUSE AND CURE WARS

As a result of fifteen trips across the Atlantic ocean, to attend great conferences and conventions dealing with international peace, Mrs. Lucia Ames Mead of Boston, in her lecture at the Junior high school last evening was able to definitely portray the causes of war, and the system by which war could be abolished in a very few years, in fact "before the youngest child present was thirty years old."

The program was in charge of Pastor Funk of the Lutheran church. The sixteen-piece band of the Salvation Army furnished several selections, and Mrs. F. Edwin Nichols sang "America the Beautiful."

In her address, Mrs. Mead declared the best educated and learned men of the time caused the late war, and it cannot be said that ignorance was the cause. A new school is being emphasized in education to stress methods and measures to secure world peace, she said. She told how preparedness was primarily the cause of wars, because one nation or nation prepares for protection, and other nations, seeing their defensive measures, prepare just a little more. Distrust arises, suspicion, and fear, and finally at some small mishap the countries go to war.

Mrs. Mead named four steps that the United States had taken as the correct preparations, which were: The first was many years ago when Washington, Franklin, Madison, and associates established the system of arbitration, where disputes could be settled without fighting. The second was to break down the barriers between states, by abandoning the inter-state tariff, thus creating a friendly feeling between the states. Third, was to remove hostilities from the Great Lakes, and to abolish all the forts. The safest border in the world today is from the Atlantic to the Pacific oceans between Canada and the United States, she declared. The fourth great step was the signing of the Multi-lateral treaty, and the confirming of this document by the United States senate.

Mr. Hansaker, president of the Oregon Council for Prevention of War, told a number of interesting facts about the Oregon branch of the national council, and urged all present who had not joined the local branch to do so at once. Mr. Hansaker also showed Mrs. Mead's latest book which is just off the press, entitled "Law of War."

Mrs. Mead and her husband were formerly workers with Andrew Carnegie in his great movement for world peace.
