CAR REGISTRATION IN STATES DURING 1928 SHOWS GAIN

The total registration of motor vehicles in the United States during 1928 was 24,493,124, a gain of 1,259,882, or 5.9 per cent over the number registered in 1927, according to reports received by the bureau of public roads, United States department of agriculture, from state registration authorities. The figures include passenger automobiles, taxis, buses, motor trucks and road tractors. In addition, 148,169 trailers and 117,946 motorcycles were registered.

Mrs. John Greb is taking treatments at Jacksonville twice a week.

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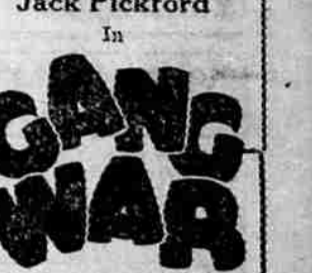
