A careful study of the entrances as given below should be made and as far as possible conform with. Ribbons and attractive prizes will be awarded, and a community spirit and pride in our valley and in a club which, although not three years old, which has accomplished so many worthwhile things, should lead everyone to do his best to make this show as large as possible under existing conditions. Flowering shrubs are counted as flowers in all classes.

- 1—Wild flowers open to all classes.
- 1) best arrangement of wild flowers, either one or several varieties; 2) greatest variety of wild flowers.
- 2—Wild flowers. Open to children 15 or under, 1. best arrangement of 12 stalks of one variety; 2. greatest variety of wild flowers.
- 3—Flowers grown from bulbs, three or five flowers in vase. (1) tulips; (a) single early tulips, (b) double early tulips, (c) Darwin

tulips, (d) Bredder tulips, (e) cottage tulips; 2. daffodils; 3. narcissus; 4. hyacinths; (a) single flowers, (b) Roman hyacinths.

IV—Primroses. (a) Primula Veris (irregular leaf and very hardy); (b) Primula Auricula (smooth leaf).

V—Table arrangements for cut flowers. Individual card tables will be provided for each display and exhibit to be arranged by exhibitor.

VI—Anemones. VII—Most unusual flower in the show.

VIII—The largest and best specimen (a) tulip, (b) daffodil, (c) narcissus, (d) hyacinth.

Local music lovers will welcome the good news that The California Oregon Power company has arranged another delightful pipe organ recital by Miss Betty Brown for Tuesday evening, April 14. The last radio appearance of this talented local artist aroused much favorable comment, and many requests for a return concert at an early date. In this program Miss Brown will be assisted by Miss Mildred Knight, well known mezzo soprano, who will sing two splendid selections. The detailed program follows: Selection from "Babes in Toyland"; "Victor Herbert 'In a Monastery Garden'"; Ketyelby "Serenade"; "Pierce Vocal solo, 'By the Bend of the River'"; Mildred Knight, "Memories of France"; Robinson Promenade Amoureuse; Baron Ilse Danube waltz; Strauss Vocal solo, "Cradle Song"; MacFayden; Mildred Knight; As Long as I Have You; Turk Pilgrims Chorus from Tannhauser; Wagner "In a Monastery Garden," another characteristic intermezzo by Albert Ketelby, the composer of "The Persian Market" with its religious atmosphere, is particularly adapted to the pipe organ. Miss Brown's arrangement of the universally loved "Blue Danube Waltz" brings out the contrasting beauties of the Reuter organ—its rich sweetness and unusual brilliance.

Her closing number, "The Pilgrims' Chorus" from Tannhauser, is one of the treasures of organ literature, and while adapted from

Wagner's orchestral score, it might stand as a perfect example of organ composition. In the middle portion is heard the insistent siren of the voice of the world contrasted against the immutable grandeur of the pilgrims' theme which increases in beauty and power to its triumphant close.

Miss Knight's first solo, which will feature one of Clara Edwards' best efforts, is of special local interest, as Miss Edwards is well known in the Rogue River valley, having visited here last summer.
