

HIGH CHURCHMEN AT DEDICATION OF CATHOLIC CHURCH

The formal dedication of the new Sacred Heart Catholic church, recently completed here, will take place Thursday morning, with Archbishop Edward D. Howard of Portland and a number of prelates from various sections of the state officiating.

Rev. L. E. McNamee, pastor of the St. Francis parish in Portland, will be master of ceremonies for the occasion. A solemn procession of the clergy and members of the choir, assistants and altar boys, will take place from the parish house to the new church at 10:20, when the dedication proper will take place.

Following the formal blessing of the edifice, the ceremony of vesting the archbishop before the main altar in the sanctuary, will be performed. Then will come the solemn pontifical high mass, to be celebrated by Archbishop Howard, assisted by a large number of the visiting clergy. The public is invited to attend the ceremonies.

Archbishop Howard is expected to arrive in Medford Wednesday evening and will be the guest of Rev. Francis W. Black at the parish house during his stay.

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WARN MOTORISTS OF OPERATION OF UNLICENSED CLUBS

The operation of unlicensed motor club organizations, claiming affiliation with the Oregon State Motor association, is presenting a problem to Medford and southern Oregon, and especially to local representatives of the association, according to George O. Brandenburg, manager of the state auto club, and C. H. Guenther, in charge of membership, who were in Medford yesterday on an investigation of the local situation with Lee C. Garlock, Medford association representative.

There has been at least two such organizations operating in Jackson county and their method has been to sell memberships in so-called mutual organizations, including insurance, for which they are not licensed by the state, according to Brandenburg yesterday afternoon. The rates, he said, are much higher than those charged by the association.

"Residents of the state of Oregon have been fleeced out of thousands of dollars in the past several months by agents of alleged fake auto clubs claiming connection with our organization," said Mr. Brandenburg. "There are two clubs which have been carrying on this nefarious practice. They both use letters much like the regular ones," he continued, "but neither of these clubs have ever been licensed by the state insurance commissioner. This makes their operation illegal, as part of their offer concerns the giving of the prospective an insurance policy, which is so cluttered up with technical phrases it is virtually worthless."

Several Medford motorists have been victimized by the agents, according to Mr. Garlock, who gave the names of a number of motorists who had purchased so-called memberships to learn later they were of no value. The service offered by the clubs is explained in terms so vague that the member has no recourse when he discovers he has been victimized. Agents who have been operating in Medford have gone, believes Mr. Garlock, adding their work, however, is continuing to live after them. Following their visit in Medford, the two visitors left for Klamath Falls, where similar alleged fake clubs have been operating. Messrs. Brandenburg and Guenther will probably be back in Medford this week.
