With 4,477,413 ex-service men and women estimated as eligible for the benefits of the so-called "soldier bonus," only 3,413,163 had received adjusted compensation policies up to a recent date. Their claims aggregated \$2,487,384,408, or an average of \$665 each.

DRAINAGE SURVEY WORK WILL BEGIN DURING SUMMER

James T. Jardine, of the Oregon State college, and director of the state experiment stations, and R. L. McLaughlin, federal drainage expert, left Medford this morning for the day in this city and valley, making a preliminary survey of the drainage conditions and arranging for a complete survey of the valley. They called upon the county court and were promised the support of that body in its furtherance.

The drainage survey is made at the request of orchardists and farmers who fear that seepage water from irrigation ditches is menacing their orchards and farming lands.

Prof. F. C. Reimer of the Southern Oregon Experiment station at Talent, says the drainage survey is planned as a precautionary step, and that it presents no problem at present, except in a few isolated spots, with the minimum of damage, that can be easily overcome.
