

BOARD NAMES 92 SCHOOL TEACHERS FOR COMING YEAR

At a meeting of the school board last night 92 of the 101 teachers in the Medford schools were re-elected to their positions. Several had already notified the board that they were not candidates to succeed themselves. Election of new teachers to fill vacancies will be taken up later.

Instead of allowing teachers and other employes 10 days on full pay for absence in case of illness, or death, in the family, as has been the case for several years, the allowance will be one-half pay for 10 days beginning September 1, 1929.

The opening of the next school year was set for September 2, 1929. The teachers have until April 25, 1929, to sign contracts. The list by schools is as follows:

ROY AND LEVERETTE TO ESTABLISH MOVIE NEW EUGENE BUILDING

Entering the Willamette valley moving picture field, George A. Roy, owner of the State theater in this city, and Walter H. Leverette, well known local realtor, will open a theater in Eugene during the month of June, to be known by the same name as the local show house. Plans for the theater have been completed and its management will be under the direction of Mr. Leverette.

Mr. Roy has been spending several days in San Francisco, purchasing equipment for the Eugene picture house, which will feature talking pictures exclusively at "twobit" prices. It will be located in a building to be constructed by Brody & Son, and planned to cover a city block in the Eugene business section. The theater, which will seat 800 people, is being established to fill the need for a moderate priced showhouse in that city, according to Mr. Leverette. There are three movie houses and one legitimate theater in Eugene at the present time, with one located in a suburban district.

ARGUMENTS HEARD IN PHIPPS ACTION

Arguments were presented this forenoon in the circuit court trial of Charles H. Phipps against the State Industrial Accident commission, following the taking of testimony yesterday. The plaintiff is seeking the sum of \$25 per month from the commission to be paid from the date of his wife's death, as the result of the death of his son in a small lumber mill southwest of Medford last year.

A sum was given to the plaintiff by the commission, but the amount was deemed insufficient, inasmuch that the dead boy was considered means of support for the family. The plaintiff presented two witnesses and the defense presented none.

Louise Thaden Establishes New Speed Record

Mrs. Louise Thaden, 23 year old San Francisco aviatrix, holder of world's endurance and altitude records, established a world's speed record for women fliers at the Oakland airport Saturday, April 13, attaining an average speed of 156 miles per hour over a measured two mile course in her Travelaire biplane "Miss Cynol". On this flight as in her previous record-breaking endurance and altitude hops, Associated aviation gasoline and Cheel aero oil were the choice of Mrs. Thaden. The speed record was officially timed by Leo S. Nagle, president of the Oakland chapter of the National Aeronautical association, and Henry Hultman, secretary. By virtue of her latest feat, Mrs. Thaden brings to the Pacific coast all of the important world's records for women fliers.

CLERGY GATHER TO DEDICATE NEW CATHOLIC CHURCH

Between 35 and 40 visiting prelates and clergymen will attend the formal dedication of the new Sacred Heart Catholic church, to take place tomorrow morning at 10:30. The attractiveness of the interior of the edifice has been enhanced by the floral decorations and the erection of a throne on the gospel side of the sanctuary, which will be occupied by the archbishop at intervals during the service.

The blessing of the church will take place directly at 10:30, after which Archbishop Edward D. Howard and his assistants will return to the parish house. A solemn procession will form there, consisting of the cross bearers, acolytes, a long line of altar boys, priests, the officers of the mass and the archbishop, and proceed to the church.

Upon the entrance of the procession into the church, the choir will sing the hymn, "Ecce Sacerdos Magnus." Gounod's Mass will be sung later.

Preceding the solemn pontifical high mass which will be celebrated by Most Reverend Edward D. Howard, the ceremony of vesting for the mass will take place at the throne. Archbishop Howard will be assisted during the mass by Rev. Wm. A. Daly of the Immaculate Heart parish, Portland, who will act as arch priest; Rev. Wm. J. Meagher, chaplain of the Sacred Heart hospital, and Rev. Bernard Clerly of Roseburg as deacons of honor; Rev. George G. Thompson, pastor of Madeline parish, Portland, and Rev. G. J. Campbell, rector of St. Mary's cathedral, Portland, as deacons of the mass.

Rev. I. E. McNamara, pastor of St. Francis church, Portland, will act as master of ceremonies, assisted by Rev. T. R. Jackson of Ashland. Rev. F. H. Scherbring of Sublimity, Ore., will act as achepiscopal cross bearer, while Right Rev. Monsignor Hillebrand, D. D., vicar general of the archdiocese, will assist in the sanctuary. The clergy will occupy the first three rows in the center of the church.

Rev. Francis W. Black, pastor of the new Sacred Heart church, extends the public a cordial invitation to attend the ceremonies.
